Turning to the question of imperial de-frence, Mr. Nesbitt held up New Zealand. with her vote of \$17,500,000 for the navai defence of the British Empire, as a lesson to Canada-a lesson that was all the more striking, coming, as it did, from a laber government. She has given us an example of unself-ishness and self-abnegation in giving her tatileship to be used wherever will be to the best interests of the empire." He erpressed the hope that Canada, by per action, would bring South Africa mes co-operation with the idea of the empire, where, thru the preponderance of the Dutch element, she might not be inclined to do so for England herself.
