The wire netting is cut a trifle smaller than the boiler and is laid flat on the bottom Canning Corn.

The very best corn should be used for canning, and it should be used as soon after picking as possible. Ramove the husks and silks and cut off the grains. Pack closely, not ton tightly, into the jar until it is full, add half a teaspoonful of salt and then fill up with cold water. Place the rubber ring in place, put on cover, adjust the spring across the top, but do not clasp the side spring against the side of the jar.
