COURTS

PLEADS GUILTY OF BIGAMY.

In the criminal court yesterday Judge Denton sentenced Annie Foster to the women's farm for six months when she pleaded guilty to the charge of bigamy. Her husband has been overseas since 1915, but in June, 1917, she went thru the form of marriage with Joseph Casteale at Port Hope.

GUILTY OF FORGERY.

Before Judge Denton in the weekly criminal court yesterday, Walter Gibson was found guilty on the charge of forgery and sentenced to 60 days in jail. Gibson forged a passport to leave Canada, where there was a declaration supposed to have been made before B. N. Plenty, a justice of the peace. Accused denied that he had any intention of evading military service, but stated he had received word that his boy was sick in Buffalo, and as he had lost his passport he filed in a blank form.

ASKS DAMAGES OF CITY.

Before Judge Coatsworth yesterday the case opened of Albert Aikin, 1204 Yonge street, who is claiming damages amounting to \$6000 from the city for alleged injury to property and compensation for loss of business time during the grading of the C.P.R. subway. F. J. Smith and H. H. Snyman gave evidence for claimant, and J. Simpson for the city. The case is proceeding.

KILLED BY DOCTOR'S CAR.

Elleen De LaPlante, 4, 96 Kenilworth avenue, was struck and killed by an auto yesterday, driven by Dr. W. H. Oakes, 2211 Bloor street. The child was playing in front of her home when the accident occurred. Pending an investigation, Dr. Oakes is being held by the police.

Sandwich Boy Was Smothered By Slide in Gravel Pit

Windsor, Sept. 4.—Nearly four tons of sand and gravel fell upon Arsenius Dupuis, aged 10, while he was at play in a gravel pit in Sandwich yesterday, and before help could arrive the boy had been smothered to death. Two other boys caught in the slide escaped with bruised limbs.

RECORD U.S. SHIPBUILDING.

Washington, Sept. 4.—Delivery of merchant ships by American shipyards in August exceeded all previous records for this country. Chairman Hurley of the shipping board, was advised today by Charles M. Schwab, director-general of the Emergency Fleet Corporation, that sixty-six ships aggregating 340,145 deadweight tons were turned out.

HONOR FOR WOODSTOCK TEACHER.

Woodstock, Sept. 4.—Miss Ruth Walker, B.A., who for the past year has been in the staff of the collegiate institute, has been asked by the Dominion Government, after competitive examination, to become a member of the examining board of the civil service commission at Ottawa.

DIED OF INJURIES.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Sept. 4.—An Austrian workman on the hydro canal, Savia Gesson, died in the hospital today from injuries received last night. He was helping to unload a car when a dump car hit him on the head, crushing his skull.

RUSSIANS JOIN CZECHS.

Washington, Sept. 4.—A Czechoslovak officer has arrived at Archangel with word that 80,000 loyal Russians are operating with the 40,000 Czech-Slovak forces moving westward along the Trans-Siberian railroad from Ekaterinburg. The news reached the state department today from Ambassador Francis.

WILSON TO ZIONISTS.

New York, Sept. 4.—On the eve of the Jewish new year, which begins at sundown Friday, a message from President Wilson expressing his "deep and sincere interest" in the progress of the development of Palestine as the Jewish homeland was made public here tonight by Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, former president of the provisional Zionist committee.

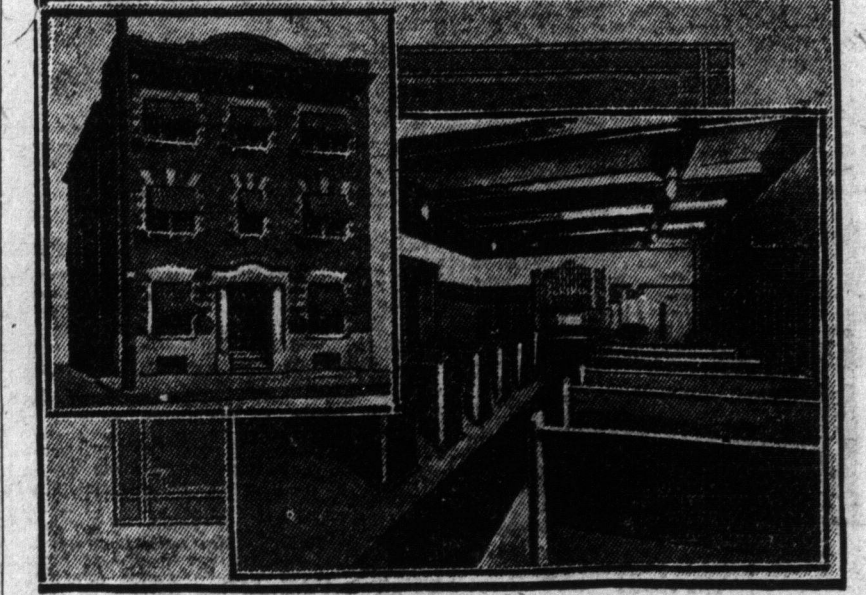

TORONTO IS BEHIND IN BIG OBJECTIVE

Less Than Half Amount Collected, With Half Week to Go.

Less than half the objective attained and with but three days to make up deficit. Such was the condition of affairs when returns were announced at the meeting of the workers on the navy league campaign at the Cafe Royal last night. Despite this hope and enthusiasm ran high every captain and every associate feeling that Toronto would today do its part nobly and with the same generosity that has made the name of Toronto famous as the most patriotic city in the world. Returns for yesterday were \$22,383, this amount bringing the total up to date of \$224,468. The objective for which the campaigners are working is \$500,000, and to reach this the hard-working president, A. M. Hoberlin, his active assistant, Frank Wise, the captains and workers generally appeal to the public with the strongest sense of the justice of their cause to open their pockets and their purse and to come out as never before to help win the war by protecting the men of the mercantile marine and their dependents.

STAGE EMPLOYEES GET RAISE.

Stage employees in the standard Toronto theatres will receive a 30 per cent increase right away. This has been effected thru an amicable conference between representatives of both the Association of Theatre Managers and the International Brotherhood of Stage Employees.
