Engineer Rust's recommendations were not observed in without numerous suggestions as to better plans and Ald. Harrison was strong in his advocacy of a more detailed scheme particularly in regard to down town extensions. He wanted it to be understood what cars would be on the extensions and at what hours they would be run with a view to fitting the convenience of the citizens as well as that of the Street Railway Company.

The report is the outcome of the many close conferences which have been held and at which friendly feeling has prevailed between the city representatives and those of the Toronto Railway Company. As it was adopted at yesterday's special meeting of the works committee to go on to council, it is that the company be ordered to extend and lay down a double line of rails on Lansdowne-avenue from College-street to Bloor-street, the track allowance created thereby on Lansdowne-avenue to be paved with granite blocks at the cost of \$26.783, to be provided by an issue of dehentures. Ald. McGhie spoke strongly in favor of a line from that section to come east by the Arthur-street route.

The Down Town Loops.

The proposed Scott-street extension was endorsed. It provides for a double lines of rails on Scott-street from Frant-street, to connect with tracks to be laid on Wellington-street, the track allowance created thereby on Cott-street, between Front and Wellington-street, to be paved with granite blocks to cost \$2408.
