HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

MEN ARE WORKING TO-DAY UNDER ORDER OF THE BOARD

Col. Gibson Objected at First, But Later Agreed—Non-Union Men to Get First Cars.

Hamilton, Nov. 30.—(Special.)—Starting Saturday morning the street cars, Radial and Hamilton and Dundas lines, will be operated by the union men who have been out on strike for nearly four weeks, and the strike-breakers will be taken to pastures new. That at least was the arrangement entered into this afternoon by the company and the union before the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board.

The board met at 11 o'clock and proceeded at once to the arbitration of the street railway troubles. The first thing the board did was to issue an order instructing all the strikers to go back to work. The order read: "The board, in order to serve the comfort and convenience of all classes of the community, hereby declares the strike off and orders and directs all the men now out on strike to return to their respective employments, and also orders and directs the companies to receive the men back, and the companies are to further put a complete service in operation."

The chairman read the order, and then said he supposed the next question would be about wages. Col. Gibson, who had been out on strike for two weeks, thought the company should have some say as to whom it should employ. It was willing to put back a majority, even sixteen-sevenths of them, but it should not be compelled to keep men who were dishonest. He asked for an adjournment for two hours, so that the company might consider the matter.

At the afternoon session Mr. Gibson agreed to obey the order, and take the men back as fast as cars were available. Many of the cars were so damaged that the company could not put them on the streets.

About Men.

W. D. Mahon, for the union, said that the strike-breakers employed were of the blackest character, and the strikers would not mix with them. "I'm about the most unpopular man in Hamilton and the most tired man," objected the colonel.

Mr. Mahon said that the men would all report to work early enough Saturday morning to take the cars out. If there were not cars for them to take, of course it would not be reasonable to expect the company to put all the men back at once.

Chairman Letich remarked that the city was in a state of siege; the citizens wanted a service restored at once, and that was why the board could not recede from its order.

Strikers and the Cars.

Col. Gibson said the company service in a position to give a better service than the public was taking advantage of. The public was taking advantage of the people who used the cars, and those threats certainly did not come from the strikers. Whenever things were not molested, but when they were molested, the strikers looked unsatisfactory. He said it was the cars were molested. He said it was a physical impossibility for the company to take all the man back at once, but it would give a reasonable compliance to the board's order.

Chairman Letich admitted that the order was drastic, but the board was doing all in its power to help the company. It was then agreed that all the strikers were to report to duty in the morning, and as many as the company had cars for would be put back to work. The company denies that it made an official announcement to Mayor Biggar yesterday that it intended to renew its strike, and that anything that could be construed into an announcement of that character, and had no intentions in that direction.

Ordered to Report.

It was a happy lot of men that left the Trades and Labor Hall about midnight to-night at the conclusion of the meeting of the street railway employees. Every man had orders to report at the hall at 6 o'clock in the morning. The men of resentment on the part of the men at returning to their old jobs was the objection of some of the men. Comment has been made by citizens about the condition of the cars since the strike-breakers have been handling them. It is even said that the strike-breakers slept in the cars at night.

There is still a possibility of complications when the company undertakes to operate the cars in the morning. Late to-night Superintendent Miller stated that while none of the fifteen non-union men who were brought in some time ago, and kept in readiness to operate the cars when the strike was restored, will be given the preference, and they will take the first cars out. The union men will then be accommodated as best can be. The company expects that it will be able to operate only 22 cars. The union men may refuse to work with the non-union.

Will Sue City.

Chisholm & Logie have served notice on the city that they will sue the city for damages caused by the strike-breakers this evening for the last time. It is hoped.

This morning, at police court, Thos. Ryan and John J. Miller, strike-breakers, were fined \$5 each for being drunk and disorderly.

St. Andrew's Ball.

The annual St. Andrew's concert and ball was held in the Arcade Hall to-night in celebration of the 71st anniversary of the St. Andrew's Benevolent Society. A musical program was presented in the early part of the evening, after which a ball was held. Among those who contributed to the musical program were: Miss Mabel Manley and Donald C. McGregor of Toronto. The annual address of William Murray, the society's bard, was read by W. M. McClelland.

Knighted for Buffalo.

About 500 Knights of Pythias left here by special train this afternoon for Buffalo to attend the Pythians' jubilee, which opened there to-day. Besides Red Cross and Bismarck Lodges of this city the party included representatives from lodges in Brantford, London, Stratford, Georgetown and Petrolia. A procession was formed at the Knights
