ADmiral BERTHOUD FAVORS AN ALLIANCE

Thinks It Would Tend to Peace and Greatly Develop Trade.

London, March 17.—Rear Admiral Lord Charles Berthoud, member of Parliament for York City, in an interview with a correspondent of the Associated Press to-day, warmly advocated an Anglo-American alliance as "a more in the direction of peace and calculated to immensely develop trade."

Hardy Candidates in Ontario Were Short of Funds.

That is the Statement Credited to Mr. J. H. Casgrain, a Close Friend of Sir Wilfrid Laurier—Bankers Off to Ottawa to Look After Their Interests—Montreal News.
