

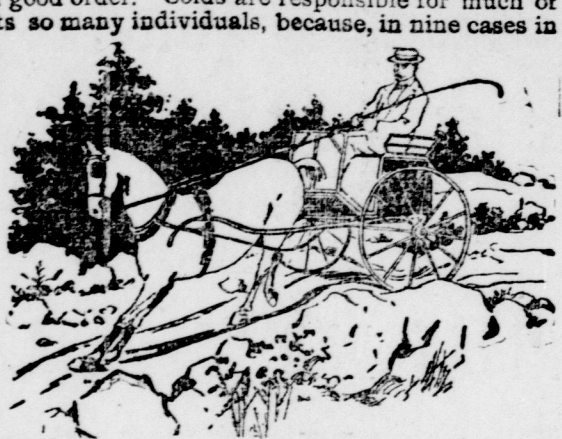

Estimate For Electric Plant

For Street Lighting Purposes. With Cost of Operation.

Tenders for Coal-The Weigh Scales Matter-Street Watering Arrangements.

At the meeting of the fire, light and market committee last night, Engineer Graydon submitted an estimate for the construction of and operating a civic electric lighting plant, showing the cost to be 25.06 cents per light for 350, as against 25 cents per light for 238 lights, 2,000 candle power, as at present paid, per contract. It was stated by Ald. Jolly that an offer had been made by an electrical company to supply the lights at 25 cents per night, on the basis of a five year contract. Against this Engineer Graydon placed \$600 per month, which he had added to the cost of the lights, in the estimate for depreciation on the \$80,000 outlay. Without the \$600, the cost would be reduced to 17.36, or 16 1/2 cents per light per night.

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Each light will cost 25.06 cents per night, or \$7 50 per month per light. The engineer said in his opinion the above was a very liberal estimate. The matter was laid over, and in the meantime a tabulated statement will be mailed to each alderman.

The retention of Mr. J. Dean as market weigh scales clerk caused some discussion. Aldermen Wilkey and Hunt spoke in favor of Mr. Dean.

Ald. Wilkey moved that the council be recommended to accept the highest tender for the weigh scales—that of Mr. S. Casey—at \$950.

Ald. Jolly moved in amendment that the council be asked to repeal the present bylaw governing this matter, and that a new one be passed appointing Mr. Dean weigh scales clerk at a salary of \$8 per week.

Ald. Hunt thought a better scheme would be to appoint an assistant to Market Clerk Wilson, and that he be given charge of the scales.

Ald. Jolly's amendment carried.

The license inspector's report showed the total amount of fees collected to date was \$671.

Inspector Bell asked that two wood

wagons be repaired. This will be done under the instruction of the engineer.

The request of Market Clerk Wilson for assistance from the fire brigade to flush the market house cellar was granted. This work is done three or four times during the summer. The tenants will be notified hereafter to cleanse their own premises.

Ten tenders were received for coal for city purposes. The contract of the Peoples' Coal Company will be recommended to the council at the following prices: Grade, egg, nut and stove, best quality, \$1 50 per ton; soft coal, \$3 20. Some members were of the opinion that the coal last year was not of the best quality. Janitor Merritt said it made a good hot fire and a great deal of ashes, much more than the coal of the previous year.

It was decided to pay Thos. Morfin for street cleaning and watering the pavement on the same system as last year. That is, \$1 75 per day, rain or shine, instead of deducting portions of data for wet weather.

Those present were: Ald. Taylor (chairman), Hunt, Stevely, Jolly, Wilkey, Gerry, Chief Roe, Inspector Bell, Market Clerk Wilson and Engineer Graydon.

London Election.

A Peculiar Sequel to the Great Trial.

Decided Windfall for Young Mr. Robertson.

How He Managed to Make Nearly \$1,000 for a Month's Work.

Correspondence Brought Down in the House of Commons.

[Special Correspondence of the Advertiser.]

Ottawa, May 11.—Some peculiar developments in regard to the conduct of the London election case are revealed in a return brought down to the House of Commons last night, on the motion of Mr. Calvert, the member for West Middlesex. The papers deal with the accounts submitted for payment by Mr. H. H. Robertson, registrar of the court which tried the election petition, the judges being Mr. Justice Robertson and Mr. Justice Ferguson. Mr. Robertson, who is a son of the presiding judge, seems to have been in a hurry to get his pay, for he wrote to the auditor-general asking for a portion of it before judgment was given. Here is the young man's bill for traveling and hotel expenses:

In a subsequent bill, Mr. Robertson charges 40 cents for laundry. He also charged \$6 a day for officiating at the trial for 22 days, but the auditor-general cut him off with 21 days, whereas Mr. Robertson claimed that he counted the Saturday evening sitting a day, and claimed he should get \$6 for it also. The next bill presented by Mr. Robertson asked for the extraordinary sum of \$304 70. Of this \$250 was for a trip from Hamilton to Toronto to leave the judgment in the case, \$5 for the day's pay, and \$798 20 for a copy of the evidence taken by the stenographer. This account was certain in regard to the number of the evidence, Mr. Robertson volunteered the statement that "the folios of the Great and the Auditor-General charged for." The auditor-general had the folios counted, and in a letter to Mr. Robertson he said to pay him for the 7,682 folios charged, as he found but 7,511 in the volumes sent. In yet another bill for attending two sittings regarding the Toronto case, Mr. Robertson charged \$18 10, and had the account certified as correct by Judge Ferguson. Another communication by Messrs. Macbeth & Macpherson, solicitors for the petitioner, informed the Deputy Minister of Justice that the trial judges had ordered that \$300 be paid to the stenographer out of the \$1,000 deposited into court for pay expenses. The counsel protested against this, and the Deputy Minister of Justice, as ordered by Judges Robertson and Ferguson. They announced that they had made a demand for the return of the \$300 received by Registrar Robertson, for which a formal demand upon him had been declined to repay it.

The Deputy Minister of Justice points out that the order-in-council, however, 1875, under which Mr. Robertson made his claim, under the extraordinary circumstances created, was passed at a time when stenographers were not employed, and when the registrar really did prepare the evidence taken down by the judge. "an very much surprised," continued the Deputy Minister of Justice, "to hear that the judges would consider an application to compel the registrar to deposit the money to the credit of the petitioner's deposit, seeing that the work actually done had already been paid for and the stenographers had been paid the full amount of the money delivered." In conclusion, the Deputy Minister of Justice gives it as his opinion that the judges have no right in law to order that the cost of taking the evidence shall be paid out of the petitioner's deposit.
