#### ONTARIO BIRTHS, DEATHS AND **MARRIAGES**

Interesting and Important Interview With Dr. Cl. T. Campbell.

The report of the registrar-general of Ontario of the births, deaths and marriages in the province in 1897, just issued, supplies a great amount of statistical information upon these important matters. But as it is not always easy for a non-expert to make the most profitable use of figures like these, a representative of The Advertiser called on Dr. Cl. T. Campbell, of the local board of health, whose experience as a statistician and a sanitarian qualifies him to discuss such a subject. In reply to the question whether there was anything of decided public interest in these tables, he said:

"Certainly. To the student of sociology statistics of this kind are always valuable and instructive, no matter for what country they are compiled. But every person should be interested in those which refer to his own counwith the Bankers. The London team, try. In the United States it is over 23; but this extends over so great an extent of country, with such varying social and climatic conditions, that it cannot be fairly used for comparison. In the North Atlantic states, which approximate Ontario, the rate is 18. I see Dr. Bryce gives Quebec as 21; and our low death-rate is not an apparent one from incorrect returns. The registration act, frequently amended, is now in practical shape that so far as the weaths are concerned, the returns are probably as nearly correct as it is possible for them to be."

"To what is this low death-rate at-

tributable, do you think?" "Mainly, no doubt, to our excellent climate. Then partly to the fact that. we have no great cities with crowded tenement houses and unhealthy slums. Much is also due to the improved sanitary regulations of both government and municipalities; something to the advances in medical science; and, professional modesty would permit, I might say that a fairly intelligent and skillful class of physicians should receive a small share of the credit.

"Let me say, however, that while Ontario has a low death-rate, it is to be regretted that so many die from consumption—3,154 during the year, nearly 1.5 per 1,000. The consensus of medical opinion today is decidedly in favor of special hospitals or sanitaria for this disease in convenient and proper localities. London's low mortality rate and generally healthy condition, indicate this neighborhood as a suitable location for such an institution; and the indication is clearer when we see by the returns that the constitute the healthiest section of the country."

"I noticed last summer that in one of our church synods it was stated that in Ontario the birth rate was very low. I see that the government report bears out that statement."

Yes; to a great extent. There were 47.323 births reported, which the registrar calculates would be 20.9 in 1,000. Now, in European countries the rate ranges from 30 to 40—except in France, where it has been getting lower every birth returns are far from complete, as the registrar says, and I should say that 50,000 would be nearer the figure; perhaps even that is too low. But at that figure we would have a rate of 22.4, if I may use my own estimate of the population, instead of 20.9 given in the report. But even this is too low a rate; and taken in connection with this other fact that the proportion of births to marriages in Britain and Europe generally 'excluding France) is 5 to 1, while in Ontario it is a little over 3 to 1, there is indicated a state of affairs worthy of serious consideration. The birth rate and the ratio of births to marriages, seems to be practically the same in Ontario as in France." "How does Ontario compare with the

United States in this respect?" "The condition in the States is very similar to ours, where the social conditions are the same. In the South Atlantic and South Central States, with a large colored population, the rate is very much higher than with us. too, in the North Central States, with a large foreign population. In the North Atlantic States those that have a large population have a higher birthrate; where the native population predominates the rate is lower. As, for indicative of a low spiritual condition example, the rate in Massachusetts is in the churches." 27, and in Rhode Island, 25.7, by the latest returns. In these states the foreign population constitutes nearly one-third of the whole. On the other hand, in Maine the rate is 22.2, and in Vermont 21.2; and in these states the foreign population is only from one-eights to one-ninth. "Well, that is a problem upon which
I do not care to theorize just now; and I do not suppose The Advertiser would have space for a sermon on it. But all these statistical tables you see, ought to be interesting subjects for study. The figures themselves prove valuable data for the solution of the problem of life; and the comments upon them, to be found in the reports, re-flect great credit on the registrar, Dr. Bryce. I notice that the printing committee of the Legislature recommend economizing in the matter of departmental reports, and specify the report on births, deaths and marriages as one, among others, that should be condensed. I only hope our legislators will apply the pruning knife elsewhere, and leave this alone.'

### **ENGLISH CAPITAL** IN ONTARIO

Ontario Government Makes a Splendid Stroke-Developing Our Blast Furnaces.

Toronto, March 27.-The legislature met on Saturday morning. Mr. Hardy announced that he thought the house could adjourn by the end of this week. Provincial Secretary Davis brought down the agreement between the government and the Sturgeon Falls Pulp Company. The agreement provides that the company shall buy out the property of the Ontario company and produce 5,000 tons of pulp per annum. The company, which is composed of English capitalists, must erect a paper mill to cost \$1,000,000, to turn out 30,000 tons of paper a year, and employ 240 people. Of the amount to be expended, \$250,000 must be expended in eighteen months, \$500,000 in 24 months, and the rest in three years. In return the government gives the company the right to cut and remove spruce, poplar, tamarack and jack-pine along and in the district of Sturgeon River and tributaries. The company must pay market rates for the spruce they cut. Hon. J. M. Gibson, seconded by Hon.

John Dryden, moved his resolution to authorize encouragement to blast furnaces which use charcoal made within the province as the sole fuel in smelting ores, payment to be made out of the mining fund of 50 cents per

Speaking on the resolution, Mr. Gibson referred to the success which had attended the establishment of a blast furnace at Hamilton, and said that a charcoal iron furnace was completed and shortly would commence operation at Deseronto, and that a second one was promised for Midland.


