## "A MISERABLE KILLING."

The Toronto News, a eulogist of the Whitney Government, refers thus to the VanZant case:

"There is nothing quite so contemptible about the dismissal of Mr. VanZant as the means by which it was accomplished. For many months gossipers and maligners were at his heels. All his words and actions were misrepresented. He was the victim of bitter and malicious criticisms outside, and of organized disaffection inside the jail. Spies dogged his footsteps. Slander was busy with his name and reputation. It was determined to accomplish his removal, and it is only singular that it should have been necessary to reveal so much meanness and nastiness in the pursuit of one defenseless public official. . . There are few conservatives in the federal public service who could survive the methods employed against Mr. Van-Zant, and we have seldom had a more pitiful exhibition of the evils of the patronage system as it obtains in Canada. Altogether it was a miserable killing, and the group of greedy spoilsmen by whom it was accomplished, when they think it over in cold blood, surely can find no real satisfaction in the achievement."

Before the farce of appointing a commission was enacted. VanZant's successor had already been chosen. A minister of the gospel was not above coveting another man's position, and lending himself to a brutal application of the spoils system.

nozzle, by gravitation? "At the start, and up to the number of three or four thousand consumers, there was hardly any question on this head. A fire hose joined to a street hydrant, would throw a stream over one hundred feet high, at a pressure of 70 or 80 pounds to the square inch. This pressure was lessended with every addition to the number of consumers. Were all the faucets working together, there would be no pressure at all for a fire hose. Even the house supply would be reduced to a dribble.

"What does this fact suggest when considering more water for fire protection? Either the use of more engines in connection with the present service, or an auxiliary supply for all but domestic purposes?

"It is in this aspect that the river flowing by our doors comes into the question, and that people ask themselves whether it would be more useful to spend half a million dollars for an additional supply of pure spring water from Komoka than to make the river available for a supply that can be relied upon for fire-fighting, and incidentally for manufacturing, street watering, and all purposes other than domestic?

"If the Komoka supply added to the present reservoir will not give an adequate fire-fighting pressure to the city mains, why any haste to spend so much money on it, since the fire protection question would remain as before, or nearly so? If an auxiliary fire service is to come anyway, why not put the first outlay upon that?

'Is there any guarantee that were the Komoka scheme adopted, the underwriters would reduce the rates of insurance on that basis? If, not, how much better off would the city
