## MILITARY SERVICE

Send in Your Problems and They Will Be Answered From Official Information by The Advertiser

Question.—A man took out American papers, but is now living in Canada. His son was born in Canada, and always lived here. Would his son be liable for service under the M. S. A.? They live on a 50-acre farm, and have a threshing machine and a well-driller, and his son is all the help he has got.

A READER.

Answer.—If the son was under 21 years of age when his father became an American citizen, the son became an American citizen also. If so, he is not liable for service. If he was over 21 at the time of his father's naturalization, and if his father was originally a British subject, then the son remains a British subject, and is therefore liable for service. for service.

If he is Hable for service, it would be up to the tribunal to decide whether he is needed on the farm or not.

Question,—1. If a tribunal hoard gives an exemption for say three months, has the tribunal power at the end of the three months to give further exemption?

2. If the board refuses to give an extension, can you then appeal?

3. For how long can an exemption be given if a man is in Category A.2?

Answer—1. If an exemption is granted.

Question—I am a farmer, and I have been exempt from military service by the tribunal. Would it be ignoring the M. S. A. If I were, on account of financial difficulties to vacate the farm temporarily to work in the city?
