

Washington, Jan. 18.—"The shutting down of all industries for five continuous days is only warranted if based apon immediate emergencies, and I have some doubts if five continuous days is the best measure," said Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, last night, "It certainly seems a very radical measure to meet the problems of transportation. 
