Phillip Scheidemann Characterizes Terms Presented by the Allies As a "Brutal Dictate d Peace" --- Declares Wilson's Fourteen Points Are Not Mentioned as Basis for Treaty.

London, May 12.—The possibility of a change in the Government of Germany as a result of the presentation of the allied peace terms, was discussed by Fhillip Scheidemann, German chancellor, at Berlin today, according to a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from that city. The chancellor denounced the peace terms, which he said represented a "brutal, dictated peace," it is said. The statement was made to foreign journalists in the former chancellor's palace, and in part follows:

"We thought that we Social Democrats were strong enough to prevent a peace by violence, but doubted whether the masses in enemy countries could support us, because they are less strongly organized than we. Certain

Berlin, May 12.—"Even if important changes are not made by the negotiations begun at Versailles, there remains no choice but to bow to compulsion and sign the treaty," says an appeal of the central committee of the Independent Socialist party in the party organ, Die Freiheit, this morning. "Not signing," continues the appeal, "means the retention of our prisoners of war, the occupation of our raw material districts, the lightening of the blockade, unembed.

Toronto, May 12 .- Although facing a charge of murder, Pte John Cook sat in the prisoners' dock in the assize court today and softly hummed a popular song, while the prosecutor outlined the crown's case against him. Later when the jury, after an hour and a half's deliberation, found him not guilty, sustaining his plea of insanity, the only emotion he showed was expressed by a low-toned grunt.

Cook was charged with the murder of Mrs. Charlotte Huntley, whose throat it was alleged, he cut with a razor following a party, in which a bottle of Scotch whiskey figured at her home last January. Chief Justice Sir William Mulock, before whom the case was heard, expressed himself as satisfied with the decision of the jury. Cook was remanded until tomorrow, when an order will be made, committing him to ow-toned grunt.
