His left fingers are like ghostly sprites as they move upon the strings, and the resulting intonation is pure, now aspiring to daring flights, now softry sighing according to the mood. Sometimes his tone is like golden cobwebs, sometimes like a gently whispering wind, and sometimes brilliant and sparkling. Although the greater portion of the program last night was made up of numbers to display the brilliant technicalities of his playing, occasionally there were glimpses of a casionally there were glimpses of a richer, more melting tone and a tenderer mood, showing wonderful possibilities for maturer years.

This diviner type of playing was hinted at in the Schubert-Marak "Ave Maria,"

The final movement of this number, unaccompanied was a wonderful display of staccato playing, while earlier in the number there was a passage which sounded as if the strings were cobwebs and the bow just inspiration. Swift upon this number, as an encore, came Bazzini's "La Ronde des Lutins," as delicate as the whirr of butterflies' wings.

Brilliant Technique.

Variations on the theme "nel cor plu non mi sento," from Paisiello's "Molinara," by Paganini, the final number of the program wholly unaccompanied, was a brilliant piece of technique, with banjo-like accompaniment with the left hand "The Devil's Trill" (Tartini) opened the evening's program, and with its difficult passages early proclaimed a virtuoso.

Among the encores there was the adored "Humoresque" and "Silanka Le Champetre," a Mazurka by Wienlawski after the third number on the program and the final encores were a Spanish dance called "Zatateado" by Sarasate, "Mobile Perpetuum" by Ries, and the last beautiful number of all "Schone Rosnarin" by Kreisler.

Asta Doubrayska, the accompanist, showed herself to be a supreme artist, absolutely in sympathy with the violinist.
