The sole head of a family, or any maid over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land. In Manicota, Sakitatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Early by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Dutles.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required, except where residence to performed it me vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

Rev. L. Ralph Sherman Pays Visit to His Toronto Parish.

Rhodes Scholar Who Has Worked Under Bishop of London.

Has Worked in London.

Mr. Sherman was admitted to the diaconate and to the priesthood in St. Paul's Cathedral by the Bishop of London. His first curacy was at the Christ Church. Oxford, Mission, and he afterwards organized and took charge of the new college mission, Notting Hill, W. Subsequently he returned to Canada and became acting rector at Trinity Church, St. John, N.B., a position which, owing to the long continued filness of the rector, proved to be one of great trust and responsibility. He is chaplain of St. George's Society in that city.

The experience which Mr. Sherman has gained, both under the present Bishop of London and in St. John, will stand him in good stead in discharging the duties of rector of one of the foremost churches in the downtown district.

A Strong Man.

The new rector made a very fevorable impression on the congregation that gathered to meet him at the 11 a.m. service. Of magnificent physique, he has a striking personality which at once commanded the attention of the gathering. 

"Rumanian front: The Austrians attempted to attack east of the Putha, pulsed. The enemy attacked the Rumanians six versts west of Brain and but were repulsed by our fire. The enemy d tackments which attempted to ten versts east of Foks and were driven back to their trenches by our

"The enemy, three regiments strong and supported by artillery, launched an attack against our advanced guards from Kotumikali, on the Sereth, as far as Vadem, ten versts southwest of Va.lov. After r polling several at-tacks our advanced d tachments abanoned the Village of Kotumikali under pressure of superior en my forces." A Be lin d spatch says: "Capture by the Teutonic forces of the Town of Vadeni, about six miles southwest of the important Rumanian trade centre of Galatz, on the Danube, is reported in the official communication issued from army headquarters this evening." The statement follows: "The Town of Vadeni, on the railroad between Braila "The Town of and Galatz, has been captured." A Berlin wireless despatch says: "The Bulgarian official report of Jan

There was a very small attendance at the North Toronto Market Saturday, and trade was quite slow, the St. Lawrence, too, having a smaller crowd than usual. Butter and new-laid eggs were decidedly weeker in price, and, tho there were still small quantities of the first named sold at 50c per lb., the prevailing high price was 47c per lb., large quantities going at 45c per lb., while numbers sold out at 44c, 43c, 42c, and a very small quantity went as low as 40c per lb. There were a few new-laid eggs sold at 80c per dozen, but here, too, the average high price was lower, being 70c and 75c per dozen, the bulk going at 65c, while some closed out at 60c, and a few still lower. Chickens were much firmer, and choice quality birds brought from 25c to 27c per lb., but the greater number of those brought in Saturday were very poor quality, and were a slow sale at 23c to 24c per lb. There were not very many ducks and geese offered, small ducks going at 90c and \$1 each, while geese sold around 23c per lb. Turkeys have not yet recovered from the decline at Christmas, and buyers did not seem to want them at 30c per lb.

Vegetables are gradually becoming more iy, and it is hoped to have the plant in operation some time next week. The plant is of 150 tons a day capacity, and will be used after the present
