

## FAVORITES SWEEP NEW ORLEANS CARD

Rapid Traveler Easily Defeats  
His Field in the Main  
Feature Race.

New Orleans, La., Nov. 27.—A succession of favorites trooping down in advance of their fields spelled repeated loss for the layers at Jefferson Park, and the windup of the afternoon found bankrolls depleted to an alarming extent. Luckily for the price-quoters, there was an absence of the expected half-holiday pastures, primarily due to the adverse weather that ruled at the beginning, but the business dispelled as the afternoon progressed, and the final numbers found the sun completely successful in its effort to penetrate the lowering clouds.

The heavy rains during the night converted the going to favor pronounced mud performers, and additionally it required a sturdy-built wader to negotiate the going with any degree of success.
