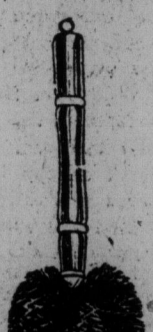

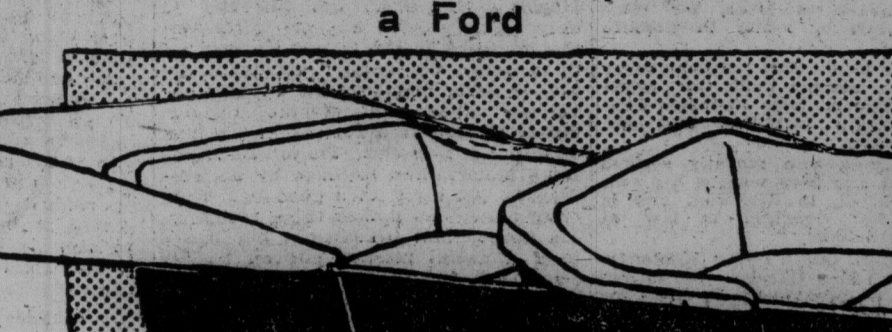

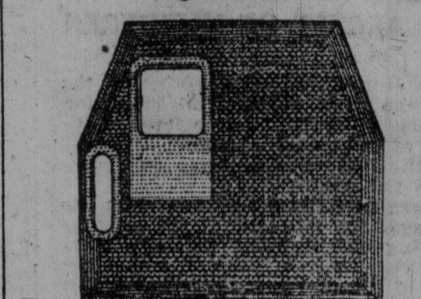

BELL TELEPHONE ASKS BIG RATE INCREASES

Company Would Raise Charge for Residence Phones to \$48 a Year—Additional Revenue Declared to Be Required to Continue Stock Dividends and Command More Capital.

"For the purpose of obtaining the revenue necessary to continue its dividend and thus command the required capital; to remove rate inequalities, and to substitute a more equitable and better devised system of charging, the company is submitting new schedule of rates for the approval of the board of railway commissioners of Canada.

"The company asks that the matter be not prejudiced, but that newspapers and municipal councils and other public bodies approach the question in a fair and reasonable spirit. We believe that the interests of all concerned will be best served by a thorough and impartial investigation by the tribunal created by parliament for that purpose."

"We are going back, as matters stand now," said Frank M. Kennedy, manager of the Bell Telephone Company, to The World last night. "We are not, as a matter of fact, in a position to attract capital, and we could not sell shares as we are now. We are trying to keep our business in the shape it always has been—on a common-sense basis. All our directors have always been men of the highest standing, and the management has ever been sane and moderate."

Exchange Service Rates. The tariff of rates for exchange service that is desired is as follows: Group I.—Comprising exchanges having in excess of 70,000 stations and 400,000 population: Local messages, 10c per month; individual line, 5c; additional messages, 4c; rural party line, \$2.75; two-party line, \$2.50; four-party line, \$2.50.

Revenue and Expenditure. It is pointed out by the company that it asked for an increase in rates of 20 per cent. in October, 1918, and in May, 1919, was granted an increase of 10 per cent., which became effective on July 1 of last year. During the year ending June 30 last, the company's earnings, with the ten per cent. increase, were only 3.418 per cent. upon the low book value of the average telephone property in service. The telephone revenue and expenditure for the year were: Telephone revenue—\$11,193,163.43; Exchange revenue—4,822,139.02; Toll revenue—2,889,915.00; Miscellaneous revenue—83,541.11.

FRANCE AND RUSSIA VIRTUALLY AT WAR

Workmen in Upper Silesia So Regard Recognition of Gen. Wrangel.

London, Aug. 16.—Workmen in Upper Silesia regard France's recognition of General Wrangel, the anti-Bolshevik leader in south Russia, as equivalent to a declaration of war on Russia, and, accordingly, will refuse to recognize the French representatives on the plebiscite commission, contending they are not neutral, says The Daily Mail, Katowice correspondent. Six trains of French troops from the Teschen area, the correspondent states, have been held up at Gliwicz by workmen who feared they were going to help Poland. The French commander, he adds, then issued an ultimatum, demanding a clear passage or he would use machine guns. The workmen are said to be armed.

The Belgian government has forbidden the shipment of a quantity of ammunition which has arrived at Antwerp from France, destined for General Wrangel, according to an Antwerp despatch to The Daily Mail. This action, it is believed, was due to an announcement by Belgian workmen that they would refuse to handle the shipment.

DR. J. C. CASKEY DIES. Ottawa, Aug. 16.—Dr. J. C. Caskey, aged 40, graduate of Queen's, 1904, and practicing physician in Ottawa for the past twelve years, passed away at his home, the Sherbrooke apartments, early this morning, after less than a week's illness from pneumonia. He was born in Tweed, Ont.

RATES PROPOSED IN NEW SCHEDULE

Flat Rates for Business Phones Are to Be Wiped Out.

Flat rates for business telephones to be wiped out and message rates substituted. Business phones to be \$60 per year for 1200 messages, and 4 cents extra for every additional message, instead of \$55. Residential phones to be \$48 per year, instead of \$38. Individual lines; two-party phones to be \$58 per year instead of \$26.40 and four-party phones in suburbs to be \$30 instead of \$26.40.

Extra charge, ranging from 5 to 25 cents to be made when particular persons are wanted on long-distance calls. Switchboards of 10 station circuits in Toronto to be \$38 per year instead of \$44. Larger switchboards, 11-30 station circuits, to be \$38, instead of \$48. Exchange trunks to be \$60 per year instead of \$30; additional trunk lines to be \$24 instead of \$20. Extension phones to be \$9 instead of \$22.

Charge of \$6 to be made hereafter for installing business phones and \$3 for residence phones; half those amounts for reconnecting. All bills to be delivered and paid monthly.

ARTHUR ECREMENT PLEADS NOT GUILTY

Former Member of Parliament Faces Three False Pretext Charges in Montreal.

Montreal, Aug. 16.—Arthur Ecrement, former member of parliament and notary of the city of Montreal, appeared today before Judge Gussion in the arraignment court on three charges of securing money under false pretences, the complaint being laid by outgoing calls in one day. An average of 2,000 outgoing calls a day for 25 days a month would show a cost of \$25,000 per annum. After adding the cost of the 16 private lines the total cost will be close to \$25,000.

Cutting is Now General of Saskatchewan Crop. Regina, Sask., Aug. 16.—Cutting is now general in practically all districts, with the exception of the Swift Current and Lloydminster districts, according to a report issued by the provincial department of agriculture. From Yonka comes an estimate of 25 to 30 bushels to the acre for wheat, and 50 to 60 for oats.

BATTERSEA MAN DIES. Kingston, Ont., Aug. 16.—(Special).—James Clark, aged 61, a prominent resident of Battersea, was found dead in his bed. He had been suffering from heart trouble.
