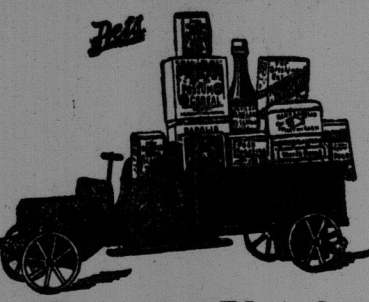

WHOLE FAMILIES ARE ENLISTING

Several Interesting Cases in This Province—Lieut. Hobkirk Appointed to 64th

To have his three eldest sons fighting in defence of the motherland is the proud distinction of John Tandy, of Newcastle. His eldest son, Jack, is on active service at the Dardanelles, as a member of the Australian navy. Frank, the second son, is now in England with the 26th Battalion, while the third son, Robert, who is only 18, has joined the 55th, and is now in training at Valcartier.

Three From Maryville
Mr. and Mrs. Alexander G. Robinson of Maryville have three sons wearing the khaki now. Their eldest son, Roy, is with the 8th Battery somewhere in Flanders and their second son, Private Jack Robinson, is now in England with a Company of the 12th Reserve Battalion in training to go to the front. He enlisted with the 56th Battalion, but was sent to England in one of the drafts. Ronald C. Robinson, who left Maryville for Halifax, is the youngest of the three brothers on active service. Before he left he was presented with a wrist watch by the Earl and Countess of Ashburnham.

Four Brave Boys
When Ernest A. Brewer of Fredericton, enlisted with Lieut. Col. Gray on Monday he made the fourth member of his family to go on active service. He is a son of Sergeant-Major Brewer of Fredericton, whose three sons are now wearing the khaki. Driver William Brewer is with the 1st Artillery Brigade in France. Private Roy Brewer is with the 26th Battalion at Sandling Camp, England, and Sergeant Roy Brewer, is with the Royal Canadian Engineers at Halifax. The fourth son is the youngest member of those on active service. He enlisted with a number of his boy chums including George C. Macnam, James Stickle and E. H. Horncastle, and they are to remain at Halifax until the battery is mobilized in Fredericton Exhibition, and will then apply for transfer.

A GAME OF HIDE AND SEEK IN THE CLOUDS

German Aviator Proved the Winner—Dropped Machine 2000 Feet and Got Away From Frenchmen

Paris, July 28.—(Correspondence)—A game of hide and seek among the clouds more than a mile above earth, in which the German Taube came off successfully, is described by a French flying officer in an interview with the correspondent of a Paris newspaper.

"We were chasing him, two of us," said the French aviator. "It promised to be a fine run. We were 7,000 and 8,000 feet up, and there was a great deal of white patch of clouds. Closer and closer to him we came, and the gunner in our plane was just getting ready to open fire, when bang! into the clouds went the German. Disappeared utterly. Swallowed up like a speck."

"All right," we thought, "he's got to come out some time." So we began making great circles around the patch of clouds. We kept on waiting until I began to wonder if the aeroplane was not dissolved in them, when suddenly my gunner by my side simply gave up with rage. Out of the cloud below us, falling down, came a German plane, the German plane for 2,000 feet, straight as a plummet, and then, righting itself, went off at 100 miles an hour for the German lines. He had escaped us fairly, by the most remarkable feat of aerial high-diving I have ever witnessed."

GENERAL SAM HUGHES VISITS THE FRONT

London, Aug. 12.—General Sam Hughes arrived at the Boulogne base on Thursday, accompanied by Colonel David Watson, of Quebec, and Colonel Carrick, of Port Arthur, intelligence officer of the Canadian contingent, and several staff officers.

Before proceeding to the firing line the general inspected the Canadian hospital. The Minister of Militia personally greeted the officers and nursing sisters, delivering a short address to each corps. As he passed down the lines of these units, drawn up in review order, General Sam Hughes noted a number of South African veterans. One, a big burly man of 40, called the general's eye—"Frisch," he has been re-baptized by his comrades.

"Where did you come from?" asked the general.

"Salsbury Plain, sir," replied "Frisch," in a brusque but thick you could cut it with a knife.

"I know, but where did you join in Canada?" further interrogated the minister.

"Montreal, sir," was the ready answer, much to the amusement of the general. After a strenuous day inspecting the tented cities, the general was alert early the next morning, making the rounds of the imperial hospitals and later departing for the front.

HIS FOURTH SON DONS THE KHAKI

Joseph R. Bennett of Halifax Proud of His Boys—Recruiting is Brisk in Halifax

One of the proudest men in Halifax today is Joseph R. Bennett of Pickford & Black's staff, whose fourth son enlisted last week in the 40th Battalion for service at the front. With him Mrs. Bennett shares the pride that four of their family should have responded to the call of Canada at this time. Besides the four sons, Mr. Bennett has five nephews in the service of the Empire, some at the front, others in various parts, notably in India.

All of the Bennett boys are well and popularly known in Halifax. Every one of them has the qualities which make for success. They were all in good positions with bright prospects for their future. They gave up those prospects, and severed ties with a delightful home circle and large number of social acquaintances for "the thing worth while today," that of fighting for Canada. Three of these boys are in the 38th Nova Scotia Battalion. They are: Harold Wilfred Bennett, Corporal; Charles Wilson Bennett, Quartermaster; Sergeant; Edgar Cecil Bennett, Sergeant; and the fourth and last son to volunteer, Oscar Hodgson Bennett, private in the 40th Battalion.

Fifty-seven men left Halifax on Monday for Aldershot. There has been a very encouraging movement of men from the provincial depots to Valcartier during the last few days. On Saturday there left Aldershot fifty-three men for the 40th Battalion, from Sussex fifty-three men for the 50th. Yesterday morning ninety-three men left Aldershot for the 40th Battalion, and from Sydney 108 men left last night. Altogether in this movement of men over the week end there is a total of 254 men from Aldershot and Sydney for the 40th, and fifty-three men from Sussex for the 50th of New Brunswick.

At Sussex the recruiting depot will be closed from the present strength of twenty-five men and officers to one officer, one sergeant, two corporals and ten men.

Aldershot, the Nova Scotia depot is to be closed in the near future and the headquarters transferred to Halifax.
