Do Not Agree

Jimmy Johnston, manager of Ted Lewis and English boxer, writes some things regarding Lewis which do not coincide with what other promoters say about that boxer. Johnston says:

"I have offered Charlie White \$1250 to box this clever Englishman, but he passed it up, claiming that he wanted a rest. Leach Cross refused to meet him. Johnston said no, and Freddie Welsh also refused to mingle with Lewis. In order to get a bout for him, I matched him with the best welterweight in the country, Kid Graves, allowing Graves to come into the ring at catchweights. Graves weighed 147 pounds, while Lewis tipped the beam at 138 pounds.

"I will match Lewis at any weight from 135 to 145 pounds with any man in the world. Soldier Barfield, Jack Britton, or anybody, and allow them to weigh five pounds more than Lewis. If you know of any of the top-notchers who will concede that much weight, I would be pleased to hear from you. This is the first time a lightweight has ever offered to tackle welterweights and give them weight. He will meet Matty Baldwin at 135, or meet Mike Glover at 145 pounds."

A few days ago Aleck McLean received an offer from Montreal for Galant to meet Lewis at 140 pounds. The promoters wired that it was the best weight Lewis could make. Manager McLean turned the offer down, as Galant is a lightweight and can make the weight easily judging from the Montreal offer. Lewis is no lightweight, but a welterweight.

Johnny Summers, a well known English welterweight, has gone to the front for his country.

Lost Great Chance

Owen Moran, English featherweight, lost a chance to become champion of Great Britain in that class through losing his head when the title was practically in his grasp. Moran has been anxious to win a Lonsdale belt emblematic of the titles of Great Britain. As Ted Lewis had to surrender the belt because he could not make the weight, Moran and Lew Edwards of Wales boxed for it in London the other night. In the 10th round, when Edwards was about done, Moran hit him low and was declared the loser.

White Knocks Out Brown.

New York, June 15—Charley White, Chicago lightweight, knocked out Young Brown, of this city, in the first round of a ten-round match here tonight. Brown was floored twice with a volley of stiff lefts before going down for the final count from a left hook to the jaw. White weighed 135, and Brown 138 pounds.
