

CAPE ARE BACK IN PARIS FAVOR, LONDON HEARS

Bolero Also Being Developed and Revival of Tunic Is Forecast

LONDON, Sept. 28.—The glory of the present is dimmed by that of the future. Styles of the Daurville toilettes leave Parisians cold. They are old-fashioned now. Interest is centered in the new autumn and winter fashions which will be worn in October and after.

BOLERO DEVELOPED

The bolero is one of the styles which is being developed. It is seen in coat-frocks in front, over a decorative waistcoat. A wine-red cloth with a faint impression all over it in the same color is used for it in the same color as the bolero. A dress which has a straight back, a bolero front over a waistcoat embroidered in red silk and all thread. Cuffs and collar of the same embroidery trim neck and sleeves. The skirt has but little fullness behind, and in front a deep inset pleat, which opens into a fan near the knees.

CAPE-COAT REVIVED

The dolman, or cape-coat, is another revival which may be popular, especially for evening wraps. It sounds heavy, but the dressmaker of today has a gift for taking all heaviness and stiffness out of materials and styles which formerly stood for all that was most pretentious in dress. The new dolman is a soft double wrap which is made of velvet, satin, velours-kasha cloth, and which is clasped about the figure in folds. It may be made for warmth, or just to complete an afternoon or evening dress. Far trims it, and the lining is chosen to match the dress it covers. It is the winter garment of the summer wrap in go-gette.


