Thomas Robb, Shipping Chief, Passes Away at Montreal

MONTREAL, Nov. 8—Thomas Robb, general manager and sec-retary of the Shipping Federation of Canada for the past 23 years, died here tonight at the age of 63

years.

Internal trouble from which he had been suffering for the past few months closed his colorful career. Two weeks ago he was removed to the Royal Victoria Hospital, where he rallied, and a week ago returned to his home. On Saturday he suffered a relapse and was again taken to the hospital. An operation was performed, after which he slowly lost strength and succumbed.

LIFE ROMANTIC Mr. Robb's life was romantic in the extreme. He had adventured all over the seven seas and had withstood many hardships.

He was born in Glasgow, Scotland, in 1863, the son of Thomas R. Robb, superintendent of police. He was educated at the Glasgow Academy and went to sea as a boy of 14. He shipped as a deck boy on a three-masted windjammer, bound for Africa, and this was the beginning of a career that brought bound for Africa, and this was the beginning of a career that brought him through "sail to steam." Thoroughly adventurous, how-ever, he did not confine his active

soul to the monotony of sailing ships, but spent many years on land in the far corners of the earth. The South African veldt, the bush of Australia and New Zealand and the ports of the Orient were all familiar to him. AIDS TO NAVIGATION

Twenty-three years ago he became general manager of the Shipping Federation of Canada and was virtual organizer of that association. Since then he has been head and the heart of that body. During his long term of office, Major Robb was instrumental in securing many improvements in aids to Canadian particular.

improvements in aids to Canadian navigation.

During the war Mr. Robb proved of invaluable service to the Canadian government, his work being recognized in his apartment as hon major in the militia. Last August the King of Jugo-Slavia paid a tribute to his services rendered that country by granting him a knighthood.

Major Robb was chosen as representative of Canadian ship owners to the joint Maritime Commission of the League of Nations at Geneva and he recently attended the sessions of the International Labor Bureau.
