Over Four Point Rise Added to Yesterday's Gain of Ten.

2,000 SHARES SOLD IN FIRST TEN MINUTES

Prices Strong, Motors in Brisk Demand in Wall Street.

MONTREAL, Oct. 2.—Continued strength and activity in Consolidated Smelters, which made a net gain of 10 points yesterday, closing at 130 7/8.

The weak issues were Shawinigan, Abitibi and Bank of Montreal, each losing one-half to 10 points, and 201 1/2, respectively. Steel of Canada and Tuckett's were slightly firmer at 92 1/2, up one-quarter, and 67, up one-half. Tramways sold the same at 119. There were no other transactions during the early trading.

IN WALL STREET.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—Stock prices displayed a strong tone at the opening of today's market, with buying influenced by the retention of the 3 1/2 per cent. discount rate by the New York Federal Reserve Bank, and the announcement that Finance Minister Caillaux had agreed to carry bank annual payments of \$40,000,000 for five years on his debt, pending a final solution of the problem. Motors were again in brisk demand, and a better inquiry was noted for the standard industrials. United States Steel common and Baldwin each opening a point higher.

FAVOR UNIFORM TRAFFIC RULES

Resolution Presented to Safety Congress Held in Cleveland

CLEVELAND, O., Oct. 2.—Uniform traffic regulations throughout the country should be adopted and traffic movement should be considered as a state and local problem of engineering importance in order that the tremendous toll of dead and injured in automobile accidents be cut to the minimum.

This recommendation was included in those adopted by the resolutions committee of the National Safety Congress in session here today. The committee declared that the thousands of accidents occurring each year could have been prevented.

"Both motorist and pedestrian should take due regard of the rights of each other," the resolution continued, "and failure to recognize their respective rights is likely to result in injury."

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That public schools and colleges should provide safety courses.

2. That drivers of machines be licensed by proper authorities and only after strict mental tests.

3. That the campaign against high-speed crossing accidents should continue and should receive the support of federal, state and municipal authorities.

4. That laws against drivers to daily should be more strictly enforced.

In an industrial safety resolution the committee urged the installation of factories of safe industrial equipment and the safe-guarding of the equipment already installed.

The committee asked that the operators encourage safe methods of handling work and that more safety habits be inculcated in the workman, when he is away from the shop, and his family.

The committee recommended the employers of everything in their power to encourage safety education in the schools.

Proceeding the meeting of the resolutions committee a discussion of the future of the safety program was held. Rehabilitation of the injured and those affected by death and injury were discussed in general session of the Congress.

OPERA SINGER HELD IN POISON PEN CASE

Indicted For Sending Improper Letter to Her Third Husband.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—Mrs. Lilla Locke Dornblaser, formerly an opera singer of note and whose fourth husband, Harry Dornblaser, once was her private secretary, was indicted by the Federal grand jury charged with sending an improper letter to her third husband, Arthur H. Marks, wealthy president of the Skinner Organ Company.

Mrs. Dornblaser was accused of having caused an anonymous letter, making scurrilous references to the present Mrs. Marks, to be sent to the Marks residence. The present Mrs. Marks was formerly Mrs. Margaret Hoover.

A damage suit for \$250,000, charging defamation of character, which Mrs. Marks brought against Mrs. Dornblaser, is said to be pending as another outgrowth of the alleged "poison pen" letter.

The letter was mailed according to the indictment, on last July 30, in Beloit, Wis. Postoffice inspectors said they found that a Pullman porter on a westbound train from New York City had received the letter from Mrs. Dornblaser's sister, Mrs. Frances Adams, who lives in Joplin, Mo. The porter mailed the letter when the train stopped at the Ohio town.

\$8,000,000 GEMS STOLEN IN N. Y.

F. W. Woolworth's Daughter Loses Two Necklaces From Platz Hotel

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—Two pearl necklaces valued at \$700,000 and other jewelry valued at from \$50,000 to \$100,000 were stolen from Mrs. James P. Donahue, daughter of the late Frank W. Woolworth, who, with her two sisters, inherited his \$50,000,000 estate, while she was in her suite in the Plaza hotel.

Entrance was gained into Mrs. Donahue's room where she had placed the jewelry in a draw in her dressing table, either while she was in her bath or during the time that she took her afternoon nap until 7 p. m.

Keys left dangling in the door furnished entrance. Police found two strings of imitation pearls, valued at about \$100 which had been placed in the drawer as substitutes. The robbery apparently was deliberately planned after a careful study of Mrs. Donahue's movements, they said.

One of the pearl necklaces was valued at \$400,000 an other at \$250,000.
