Present "Why Men Leave Home" Cleverly at the Opera House.

"Why Men Leave Home," a three act comedy from the pen of Avery Hopwood, was cleverly presented in the Opera House last evening by the F. James Carroll players. The new bill attracted a large audience and the clever interpretation of the various roles evoked hearty laughter and rounds of applause. Her charming personality lent itself well to the part, her clever acting was a treat, and she was accorded appreciative applause. Miss Marsh and Miss Monroe her travelling companions, and frivolous wives, also acted their parts in a pleasing and clever manner as did Miss Odoon in the role of a younger sister.

Miss Kelton as Grandma Sutton, has a pleasing role and one which she handled most capably. Her advice to the interested parties was largely responsible for the restoration of peace and real home life. She played the role with true sympathy and was a general favorite.

Mr. Coots, as Tom Morgan, was responsible for bringing matters to a head and his part, which called for some real acting, was well handled. Mr. Nelson also acted his part in the conspiracy and altogether their acting was all that could be desired.

On the whole the play was a popular one and the clever manner in which it was portrayed won the admiration of all present.

## INQUEST INTO DEATH OF CHILD

The inquest into the death of George James, two and a half years old son of Mr. and Mrs. George P. James, 99 Broadview avenue, was concluded in the Court House, German street, last night before Coroner A. F. Emery. After five witnesses testified the jury brought in a verdict that the child came to his death by being run over by a team driven by Allie Ford, on August 30, and that no blame be attached to the driver, as death was purely accidental.

Allie Ford, driver of the team, said the first intimation he had of any trouble was hearing some children scream. He stopped and picked up the boy and carried him into his home. He thought the child must have stepped from the sidewalk and between the wheels.

## YOUTH KILLED IN FIGHT WITH BULL

Only Son of F. Edson White, President of Armour & Co., Dies as Result of Discharge of Clubbed Gun When Attacked by Infuriated Animal.

Chicago, Sept. 11.—F. Edson White, Jr., 15, only son of the president of Armour & Company is dead as a result of a wound received when his shotgun was discharged as he used it to ward off an attack by a bull on his father's estate near Lake Forest. With him was A. Watson Armour, Jr., also 15, son of the vice-president of Armour & Company, who shot, wounding the animal and drove him off when he attempted to gore the fatally wounded boy.

Young White had jumped a fence surrounding a pasture, when the animal, a prize bull owned by Mr. White, rushed with lowered horns. White grasped his gun by the barrels and brought the stock down on the bull's head. The force of the blow dis-

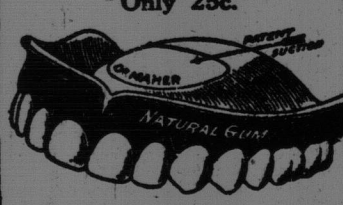

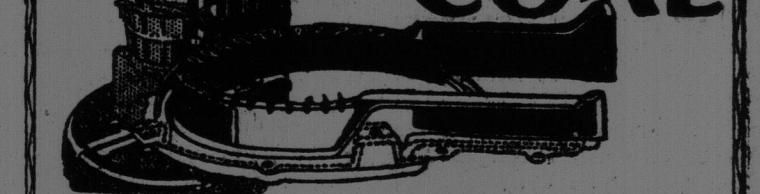
