LEGISLATION TO BAR STALLS IN RESTAURANTS

City is to Send Bill to N. B. Legislature

Call for Tenders for Further Deepening of Newman Brook—The Daylight Time Period—Tenders for Engines for Stone Crushers.

The city commissioners, in committee this morning, decided for a bill to bar stalls from restaurants, passed on the matter of the further deepening of Newman brook, and recommended to council the calling of tenders for the work. The proposed period for daylight saving time was decided upon.

Commissioner Frink submitted the city engineer's report on the proposed side track in Albion street to serve the proposed new Ford factory, and the whole matter was on motion referred to the city solicitor for report.

A copy of a resolution from the St. John Local Council of Women endorsing vocational training, the desirability of continuing the classes and the proposed establishment of the scheme in the city, was read and referred to the mayor for consideration with other communications on the subject.

Commissioner Jones brought up the matter of the further deepening of Newman brook and read a report of the city engineer. He said that the proposed work was to provide for further development of the area drained by the brook.

The engineer said if the bridge spanning the brook at Millgateville avenue was to be removed this year or next and replaced by a culvert, he thought the deepening of the whole brook should be carried out at once.

Mr. Jones moved that the brook be deepened a further six or eight feet and a culvert be placed under the bridge, the cost to be paid by bond issue. (The estimated cost is \$117,000.) And that tenders be called for the work. Carried.

Tenders for two engines for the city stone crushers were opened. Commissioner Frink remarked that the tenders had closed at 11 o'clock, but some were delivered at that hour.

The mayor said that in future tenders should be given to understand that if the bids were not delivered at the specified hour they would not be considered. The figures were: A. R. Williams Machine Co., \$900 and \$1,000; E. Leonard & Sons, \$890 and \$1,050; Canadian Allis, Chalmers Co. Halifax, \$1,100 and \$840; Goldie & McCullough, \$2,100 and \$2,800; Sawyer, Messerly Co., \$3,900 and \$2,700; Estey & Co., \$790, \$840, \$1,100 and \$1,390; Robb Engineering Co., Amherst, \$1,450 and \$1,900; Canadian Fairbanks Morse Co., \$805.85, \$882.25, \$988.25 and \$1,128.75.

The tenders were submitted to Commissioner Frink for report.

Workmen's Compensation. Commissioner Frink reported that \$1,000 had been provided for in the estimates for workmen's compensation but he had received a bill from the board for \$1,617.18, and a letter saying that the bill must be paid in fifteen days.
