HOLIDAY OR TWO MAY  
COST THEM \$1,900

Ottawa, Sept. 3.—While adjournment today was ostensibly for the purpose of studying the peace treaty the number of members who employed the holiday in that way was comparatively small. Tonight, at least, was spent in an animated discussion in the smoking room over the far more vital question of how the session indemnity is going to work out. Some members who were contemplating a brief holiday found to their horror that by doing so they stood a good chance of dropping about \$1,900. W. S. Middleboro, the government whip, was the man who threw this bomb into their midst. The act provides that for every session of the House the indemnity shall be \$2,500, and a member shall not be entitled to the full indemnity for less than thirty-two days attendance. His allowance for any less number of days shall be twenty dollars a day so that by being absent one day he would lose just \$1,900. Sundays and holidays, however, are included in the thirty-one days, as well as any days when the House is adjourned, such as today.

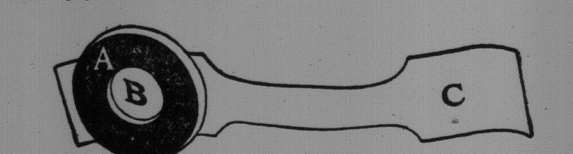

## RUSSIANS FROM CARPATHIA FORM VOLUNTEER UNIT

Many Czecho Slovaks Have Also  
Joined Kolchak's Siberian Army  
—Turkistan Desolated

Omsk, Sept. 2.—(Russian Telegraphic Agency)—The Carpathian Russians in Siberia have formed a volunteer corps and joined the Siberian army. Many Czecho-Slovaks likewise have joined the volunteer forces and have asked to be despatched immediately to the front.

Refugees who have arrived here from Turkistan declare that the country has been thoroughly devastated by the Bolsheviks. They report the cotton plantations destroyed and the population poverty-stricken.

More than 200 delegates attended the fifth extraordinary congress of the Siberian Cossacks, recently concluded. The congress approved the mobilization of the Cossacks up to the age of sixty-five years, and expressed its readiness to make all sacrifices necessary for the victory over Bolshevism. It adopted the following declaration unanimously:

"In this time of great trial for our native country, we, the Siberian Cossacks, are placing all our strength at the disposal of Admiral Kolchak, who is leading the Russian armies against the enemies of the Russian people, and under whose leadership the Russian armies are fighting for the regeneration of a united, great and democratic Russia."

Admiral Kolchak (the head of the Omsk government, appeared before the congress, and in an address thanked the representatives of the Siberian Cossacks for their display of patriotism.

The Ministry of Supply of the All-Russian government has sent to the provisional government of Northern Russia nearly 10,000 tons of wheat; more than one million pounds of butter and great quantities of other foodstuffs. Large supplies of wheat, rice and tea have also been sent by the Northern Sea route for the army of General Jurenevich, in command of the Russo-Bathonian forces operating in the Petrograd region.

## TOWN TAKES HERMIT'S UNWILLED \$25,000

Providence, Sept. 4.—When Eugene Wilson of East Providence dropped dead in his doorway he left his life fortune of \$25,000 with no known heir to claim it. Fred B. Holliday, former town treasurer, who was appointed administrator of Wilson's estate, will turn the real estate and personal property over to the town, which will use the income on some public improvement.

Wilson was something of a hermit. He lived in a cottage in Prospect street, where he died. He had few intimate friends and they had no idea whether any relatives survive him.

He was a born New Englander, coming from the great family of Wilsons in this part of the country.

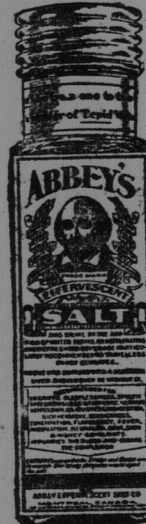

## TO SELL CARS IN UNITED STATES

Raising of Import Restrictions in  
Britain Worries Manufacturers

London, Sept. 3.—The motor car manufacturers of Birmingham are greatly concerned over the situation created by freeing American imports. Mr. McCormack of Wolsey Motors, Limited, told the Daily Mail correspondent he understands that the Society of British Motor Manufacturers is making protests to the government.

"If imports of motor cars are unrestricted," said Mr. McCormack, "there is grave danger that the British markets will be flooded next season, the efforts of British manufacturers and organizers for mass production will be frustrated and thousands of people who might have found employment in motor industries will be idle. British motor manufacturers will be compelled to revert to pre-war practice of limited production and consequently high costs."

The Lancaster Motor Company, Limited, will retaliate by selling Lancaster cars in the United States. They believe there is a good market in America for Royce-Rolls, Daimler and Lancaster cars.

## LONDON BUS GIRLS GIVING UP THE JOB

Resigning to Make Way for Men  
Home From the War

London, Sept. 3.—The London budgetette, that sorry, smiling girl in smart blue uniform and gutters who has punched our tickets each day for the long years of the war is losing her smile and merry chatter.

She is shortly to leave the rumbling, jerky vehicle which has been her daily home for so long, to be replaced by the men whose place she so nobly and heroically filled while they went forth on the sterner work of war.

And she contemplates sacrificing her post with the keenest regret, tempered only by the remembrance that she is giving it back to the men who have a greater claim to it than she has the men returned from "over there."

There is little doubt that in spite of being exposed to stormy weather and often unreasonable customers, these women and girls thoroughly enjoy their work.

"Of course I'll be sorry to go," said a sturdy looking girl of cheerful countenance. "We don't know when it will be, but I think we may all be 'out' by Christmas."

"I've got lots of fun out of the life," she continued, "and never found it monotonous. I can't see myself going back to indoor work; this open-air job suits me down to the ground."

"I've been at it for three years now and never been sick one day. They used to say we women never would stand it—well, I don't suppose there's many men as has a better record than mine."

At the same time this girl was big minded and patriotic enough to realize that the discharged soldier had more right to the job than she. In her opinion most of the women conductors would leave the bus with regret, but there would be "no kicking about it."

MISLED BY SYMPATHY.

Served "Wet Chauffeurs" and "Nervous Actors."

New York, Sept. 3.—Assertion that federal officers who arrested them obtained liquor on the plea that they were "wet chauffeurs" or "nervous actors," three bartenders rounded up in the recent crusade against violators of the war-time prohibition law pleaded guilty in the Federal District Court to having sold liquor illegally and were fined \$50 each. Nearly three score others entered pleas of not guilty.

Judge Foster, in imposing sentences, said that the repetition of the offense would bring a jail sentence, and that unless the violations of the law were checked jail sentences would soon be imposed in all cases. "Don't allow yourselves to be misled," said the judge, "by the appeals of 'wet chauffeurs' and 'nervous actors.'"

## LIBERAL UNIONISTS WILL BE WELCOMED

Ottawa, Sept. 3.—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party, today made some comments on the fact that Hon. W. S. Fielding has taken a seat in the front row of the opposition benches on the floor of the commons.

"Mr. Fielding's seat at the same desk with D. D. McKenzie," said Mr. King, "should be an all-conclusive answer as to the attitude of the Liberal opposition towards the constitutional Liberals. It is another evidence that Liberal-Unionists, far from being excluded from the Liberal party, are welcome, and will be welcomed in the most cordial way. The Liberal party today, whatever may have been its differences, desires the co-operation of all those who believe in its policies and its principles. Our look is towards the future, not the past."
