Arthur P. Hazen, manager of the Bank of British North America, left last night for Montreal where he will become manager of the Montreal branch of the bank.

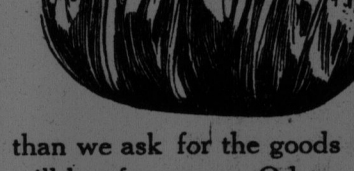
