

Men, women and children scattered in terror before them until Cummings, who was standing near the horse, leapt into the air and an instant later had his left leg across the off horse's back. He seized the reins and ran the truck over the curb on to the sidewalk. Then slipping into the driver's seat he put the team "through a course of sprots," as he termed it. When they got back to the fire they had lost all desire for running.

"That was easy," said Cummings as women and men crowded round him. "When I was a kid I served an apprenticeship on the range, and I'll bet I can ride any horse that ever sniffed grass. I could have landed on my feet on that horse's back if I'd wanted to."

The damage caused by Russo's fire was slight.
