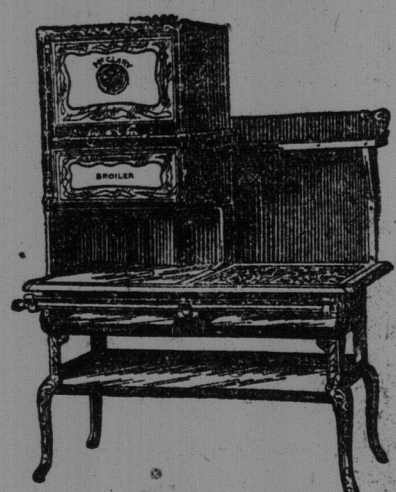

New York, May 2.—William R. Montgomery, former president of the Hamilton Bank, was taken from the Tombs to Sing Sing prison today to serve not less than five years and two months for larceny.

He was convicted last February of larceny of \$4,000 of the bank's funds, just before the institution closed, and appropriating the money to his own use. There are other indictments against him.

Montgomery came here from St. John (N. B.).
