## POPE PLEADS FOR ANIMALS.

Sends \$40 to Aid Roman Anti-Cruelty Society's Work.

Chicago, Sept. 8.—Word has reached here that Pope Benedict XV. has lately sent a contribution of 40, through Cardinal Gasparri, to the Roman Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

In addition, it is stated, the cardinal was directed to send a letter condemning all wanton destruction of animal life by unscrupulous sportsmen, who caused untold suffering to the victims by traps and such like devices.

Particularly fond of birds, His Eminence has caused to be issued to all parish priests a circular letter instructing them to dissuade boys from the evil practice of robbing birds' nests and snatching them, and to preach from the pulpits against all forms of cruelty to animals.

When forwarding the gift the pope expressed that it might encourage others throughout the world to help on all such beneficent work.

## PLEA TO SCIENTIFIC MEN NOT TO DEVELOP CHEMICALS FOR WARFARE

Edinburgh, Sept. 8.—Protests against chemical warfare were uttered last at a meeting of the British Association here last night. An address written by Sir Edward Thorpe, president of the association, was read by Sir A. E. Wing, and appeals to scientists "not to employ their talents in devising means to develop and perpetuate a mode of warfare which is abhorrent to the higher instincts of humanity." More than 2,000 members attended the session.

## CANADA REPRESENTED.

Wellesley, Mass., Sept. 8.—Virtually every university in the U. S. and Canada was represented at the sixth summer meeting of the Mathematical Association of America, which commenced a two day session here yesterday.

A technical lecture by Prof. James Pierpont, of Yale, on "Some new aspects of the Theory of Relativity," was a feature of the day's meeting.

## SCHOOL FUMIGATED.

Janitor's Family and Dog Had Taken Up Residence.

London, Aug. 22.—(By mail.)—How a man, his wife, and five children, and a dog, unable to get a house, took possession of a village school and lived there undiscovered for a fortnight, was described at Sulstone, Leicestershire, on Saturday at an emergency meeting of the school managers called to deal with the situation. The man was the school caretaker, and the managers, taking a serious view of the matter, appointed a new caretaker and arranged for the fumigation of the schools.

## FORECASTS AN ACCEPTANCE BY BUILDING WORKERS

Chicago, Sept. 8.—Acceptance by the building trades employees, of a wage decision handed down yesterday by federal Judge Landis was forecast by Thomas Kearney, president of the Chicago Building Trades Council today after a long meeting of leaders of the council last night.

"We are obligated to accept the decision more than others to the arbitration agreement," he said, "because Judge Landis was our choice for arbiter."

## IN WALL STREET.

New York, Sept. 8.—(10.30.)—Resistance to the recent rise in the stock market was indicated by the opening of today's market. Mexican Petroleum, Studebaker and American Sugar were under moderate pressure, but otherwise the market was firm.

Particularly strong was the market for foreign exchange, which showed a strong upward movement in the British rate, while marks or German bills fell to their lowest quotation in eighteen months.

## Noon Report.

New York, Sept. 8.—Several of the more important industrial, especially equipments and various obscure food specialties made further gains in the early dealings. The market reversed its course before noon, however, when Studebaker and the cheaper motors reacted. Mexican Petroleum, Atlantic Gulf, American Sugar and United Drug also were heavy, the latter repeating its recent low record. American Car preferred, Pullman, Northern Pacific and Soo fell one to two points. United States Rubber and Kelly Springfield were the only issues to show consistent strength. Call money opened at 5 1/2 per cent. The exchange, but outside offerings were made at five per cent.

## NEW YORK AND MONTREAL.

New York, Sept. 8.—A national system of port development in the U. S. was advocated by members of the American Society of Civil Engineers at a meeting here last night. Frederick W. Cowie, chief engineer for the Montreal Harbor Commissioners, asserted that the United States had a larger business in proportion to its facilities than the port of New York. The backwardness of New York for a port was due to lack of sufficient competition to force proper developments.
