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ONLY TWELVE MILES.

Small Distance Now Separates Russian and Japanese Forces—An Offer to Surrender Port Arthur.

St. Petersburg, July 5.—The latest despatches from the seat of war are to the effect that Gen. Kuropatkin is still at Tatchekiao and that the Japanese forces are stationary at Sengcheng and along the roads from Suiyen to Hailuogang, Tatchekiao and Kaichow, but they are maintaining their advance from Fengwangcheng over the direct main roads to Liaoyang, where the effect of the rains is less appreciable. There are only 12 miles between them.

Is Vladivostok Fleet Lost? St. Petersburg, July 5.—The Vladivostok squadron is understood to have returned safe to port.

Offer to Surrender. St. Petersburg, July 5.—It is reported that Russia has through France offered to surrender Port Arthur to Japan, together with its ships and arms, providing the garrison is freed. A confirmation of the report is impossible and it is generally regarded to be untrue.

Accuse Russians. Tokyo, July 5.—Gen. Oku makes the following charges: That on June 15 six Japanese scouts were overpowered by Russian troops, who ran bayonets in their mouths, in their hands and cut their breasts open, that on June 27 the Russian captured a Japanese cavalryman, whom they bayoneted and then cut his abdomen open; on May 15 the Russian beheaded a Japanese cavalryman whom they captured.

PATIENT BRITAIN WAITS. The Prime Minister's speech on the Russian situation.

London, July 5.—In the House of Commons yesterday, Earl Percy, the under Foreign Secretary, announced that the British government is waiting for the Russian government to make a decision on the subject.

The Secretary also said that as the owners of the British steamer Allanton, captured by the Russian Vladivostok squadron, were appealing to the supreme prize court at St. Petersburg against the confiscation of the Vladivostok court, the British government intended to wait the decision of that tribunal before approaching the Russian government on the subject.

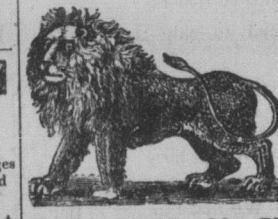
