SIR WILFRID ON WAY HOME

REINVIGORATED AND ENTHUSED BY HIS TOUR

Minister of Railways Goes North on Matters Connected With Hudson Bay Railway

(Special to the Times.) Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 6.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier reached Winnipeg on his special train from the west Saturday afternoon and started on his tour of inspection, proceeding to Ottawa Monday morning.

Hon. Geo. P. Graham left Saturday night for a trip of inspection over the new G. T. P. line to Saskatoon, thence north to Prince Albert, and on to Pass Lake, where he will inspect the preparations for the government bridge over the Saskatchewan river and make initial preparations for the route of the projected Hudson Bay railway.

It is probable Mr. Graham will have important data to lay before parliament when it meets. A decision as to the harbor terminal on the bay has not yet been made. The minister expects to confer en route with representatives of railways regarding construction plans.

G. T. P. CLOSES DEAL FOR SITE FOR BIG HOTEL

Railway Company Secures Property Valued at Nearly Three Hundred Thousand Dollars on Cor. Government and Belleville Streets

The option taken by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company on the site for their big new hotel, to be built on Government street opposite the parliament buildings, has been taken up and more blocking added in order to round out the site.

While the present site is ample for the company to erect a first class hotel, considerably larger than the Empress, and still have lawn surrounding it, the company would have taken more had it not been that the owner of one lot wanted much more for it than they considered it worth.

The prices of the other properties purchased are: Fred W. Spencer, sr., and Charles Spencer, \$165,000; W. G. Cameron, \$20,000; D. Vasilatos, \$25,000; Dr. Stander and Geoffrey Burt, \$71,000, making a total sum of \$291,000.
