THE ALLIANCE VARN

Fall Mail Gazette Reiterates the Statement That Britain and Germany Have Signed One.

Sail To Have an Understanding Regarding Their Interests in Various Parts of the World.

New York, Sept. 3.—A special to the World from London says:

Little credence is attached in well informed circles to the reported British-German alliance. In the past fortnight the German ambassador had almost daily interviews with Mr. Balfour, who is acting as foreign secretary, and the rumor is conjecture founded on these reports. It is regarded as highly possible that Mr. Balfour is engaged in negotiations and arrangements for the reconstruction of the mixed tribunals in Egypt, whose existence expressly lapses some time next year.

Germany demands some consideration for siding with the British in this matter, and it is generally believed that which Delagoa Bay is to be acquired from Portugal on the understanding that Germany is to obtain certain trading facilities there. Beyond that there is believed to be nothing in the air between Britain and Germany at present. In financial circles, where the report originated, there is a tendency to show support for Portuguese stocks, which have been very firm, and South African stocks, which are somewhat depressed on the prospect of the long-rumored Delagoa Bay difficulty being adjusted.

London, Sept. 3.—The Pall Mall Gazette this afternoon says that a fact that an Anglo-German alliance has been reached in the various quarters of the world. The paper adds that it has verified yesterday's information and assistance when Germany's support will prove extremely useful, points out that the fall of Ondurman will change Great Britain's position, and that the alliance will be a useful guarantor of our permanent occupation.

The London reports of an offensive and defensive alliance having been concluded between Great Britain and Germany are entirely without foundation. The British ambassador here, Sir Frank C. Lascelles, when asked an opinion on the subject, said that an agreement already exists, Germany's position that Britain will share in the Egyptian Sudan, and that France, should hold Egypt, although all that Germany expected from the British occupation has not been realized. An Anglo-German understanding regarding the rest of Africa also exists. The recent meeting between Mr. Balfour and Count von Hatzfeldt dealt with other matters.

BERLIN NEWS

Berlin, Sept. 2.—A semi-official note issued today says: "A state of peace between the British and German empires has been given that the German naval force at Manila be reduced to one or two ships, which would be completely neutralized by order in the Philippines will suffice for the protection of German subjects and interests in that region."

Berlin, Sept. 2.—It is the intention of Russia, according to reliable information obtained by the correspondent of the Associated Press, to convene a peace conference a month after the adjournment of the Spanish peace conference.

Yokohama, Sept. 2.—An agitation is growing out of the state purchase of trunk railroads, and reports are revived that the government intends to raise a foreign loan of \$80,000,000 in order to complete public works. Little importance is attached here to the czar's peace note as it is believed to have been dictated by financial depression.

VIENNA, SEPT. 2.—An imperial decree has been issued summoning the reichsrath to meet September 26th.

Buda Pest, Sept. 2.—Newspapers here state that a plot to murder Baron Banffy, Hungarian premier, has been discovered.
