**ENGLISH M. P. AGED 23,  
MAKES BRILLIANT SPEECH.**  
LONDON, March 4--An interesting  
incident of yesterday's sitting of the  
House of Commons was the promoting  
maiden speech of Viscount Tournour,  
who is not yet 23 years of age. He  
was warmly congratulated by many  
members, including Sir Edward Grey,  
who complimented him on sharing the  
police and the negro premier, William  
Pitt.

**POLICE AND NEGROES BATTLE.**  
TAMPA, Fla., March 5--Early to-  
day the police had a lively fight with  
negro gamblers, in which one of the  
latter was killed and another wound-  
ed in the leg. Two policemen and a  
special warden discovered a party  
of fifteen negroes playing in a house.  
They demanded admittance but the ne-  
groes refused to open the door and  
threatened to kill anyone who entered.  
When the police broke open the door  
they were attacked by three negroes,  
one with a chair, another with an axe,  
and a third with a pistol. The latter  
shooting as he came out. The officers  
returned the fire and one of the  
gamblers, Paul Jenkins, fell, fatally  
shot, and another, Henry Hall, was  
wounded.

**EARL CAWDER HAS BEEN APPOINTED**  
First Lord of the Admiralty.  
LONDON, March 5--It is officially  
announced that Earl Cawder will suc-  
ceed Lord Selborne as first lord of the  
admiralty.

Earl Cawder's appointment to the  
first lord of the admiralty is somewhat  
of a surprise, as having since his  
accession to the earldom taken no ac-  
tive part in politics and being abso-  
lute in railway management. His busi-  
ness qualifications are so sound, how-  
ever, that though he steps into the  
cabinet at a bound and without ex-  
perience in minor offices of the minis-  
try the appointment is well received  
all round.

As the head of the admiralty is con-  
sidered to be a good place for a cap-  
able business man, Earl Cawder will  
resign from the chairmanship of the  
Great Western railway.
