ORDNANCE CORPS BUSY PREPARING FOR CAMPS

Large Quantities of Stores Being Shipped From St. John to Sussex, Woodstock and Newcastle-Advance Parties Leave on Saturday.

The St. John depot of the Ordnance Department is busy these days getting out supplies for the militia camps which open next Tuesday. Three camps will be held this year, viz: at Camp Sussex, at Newcastle and at Woodstock. All the equipment and various stores used at these three camps are kept at St. John except when in use and are shipped from here when required. Last year, owing to the renairs to the ordnance building, a large part of the stores were kept at Sussex throughout the whole year, but now with the increased space there is plenty of room for everything at St. John. About the usual quantity of supplies will be sent to the camps. Any dimunition of the number of men in camp affecting this only slightly.
