FOUND IMPORTANT ERRORS IN CHARTS

Reports

Trip ?- Nobody Orowned on Wreck -Lowly Job for Sq. Rigger.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 31—Errors in navigation charts which are of immense importance to all shipping interests on the Atlantic Ocean have been discovered between Madeira and Bermuda by the scientific staff of the yacht Carnegie, which is making a magnetic survey of the ocean for the Carnegie Institution of Washington.

Reports to Dr. L. A. Dauer, director of the department of terrestrial magnetism, who has immediate charge of the survey, describe the discovery that some of the charts now in use are two and three degrees out of the way. The errors are of a systematic nature and the charts are erroneous in the same direction for considerable distances.

The discovery of these errors makes it possible to reduce even further, the time of passage of the Atlantic liners.


JAMES PENDER TO MANAGE BIG PLANT

BANK PARTED WITH PRIVATE SECURITIES

Mining Man Charges U. S. Bank in Me

With Stealing \$100 000

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 1.—Herwood P. Simpson, a mining man, has mada formal complaint before the procurator of justice alleging abuse of confidence by the United States Banking Company, which closed its doors last Wednesday. Simpson alleges that some time ago he obtained a loan of \$19,000 from the bank, giving three notes and securing them by a deposit of mining stocks worth \$100,000. When he tried to pay his notes, he alleges, his collateral was not forthcoming, and he learned later that they were no longer in the bank's possession. He infers that they had been hypothecated by the bank to some other institution.

Simpson did not ask any arrests, but filed his complaint as a matter of protection.
