VENEZUELA CASE.

As It Served Up for Yankee Readers.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—Herbert V. Bowen, Venezuela's representative in the negotiations for a settlement of the claims against that country, has sent through the British ambassador here, amounts practically to an ultimatum to the allied powers of Great Britain, Germany and Italy regarding their insistence for preferential treatment in the settlement of their claims against Venezuela. This note, which the British ambassador received shortly before 9 o'clock tonight, was called at once to London, copies of it being transmitted to the Italian and German embassies for transmission to Rome and Berlin. It is in reply to the proposition submitted at a joint conference of the negotiators this afternoon by the British ambassador that the allied powers be allowed two-thirds of thirty per cent. of the custom receipts of the ports of Laguaira and Porto Cabello, and that the United States, Belgium, Holland, Denmark, Spain and Norway and Sweden, content themselves with the remaining one-third of the percentage, that is, ten per cent. of the receipts of these two ports.

In the note received by the British ambassador from Mr. Bowen tonight the latter refuses point blank the proposition for a twenty and ten per cent. division, on the ground that to recognize the principle it embodied would be absolutely contrary to modern civilization. In view of the fact that the negotiators are agreed on all save the question of preferential treatment the ambassador is informed that Venezuela has decided to submit the question to the Hague arbitration. Acceptance of this proposition, Venezuela contends, carries with it the recognition of the general understanding being that the blockade of Venezuela is a measure of self-defense and not a measure of aggression.

It is understood that in refusing this last proposition submitted by the British ambassador on behalf of the allies Mr. Bowen has made it really a note of defiance, in principle the contention that blockade and the killing of helpless men, women and children, entitles any power or alliance of powers to preferential treatment at the hands of a civilized nation.

It is claimed that the peace powers and the blockade powers agree to such a settlement. In the latter part of the note, a doctrine in conflict with the two agents of all modern day ethics.
