Miss A. Bruce Morr of Calais spent Sunday with her sister Mrs. H. O. Chubb.

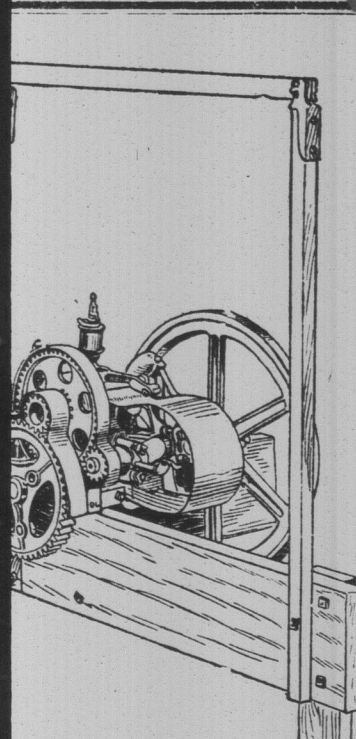
John Chubb and sister Carrie and Jas. Seavey were at Eastport Saturday.
