UNITED STATES' HAND SEEN IN NEW ALLIANCE

Lloyd George Said to Have Been Largely Influenced by America.

Cannes, Jan. 12.—Definite opinion has arisen since yesterday, when it first became generally known that a specific Anglo-French entente would be a result of the Cannes meeting, to the effect that Premier Lloyd George's position is being largely influenced by the United States.

It is certain that Lloyd George was not so favorable to the alliance when it was suggested by Premier Briand as he is today—when he is more completely in possession of the American viewpoint.

Embassador Grey, on account of yesterday's accident, writing to his physician, has no more communications for the American press for at least three days.

French Press Attacks Briand. Paris, Jan. 15.—Attacks on Premier Briand by the French press increased in severity and distrust.

May Need the Aid of France. The Temps takes it for granted that such a special agreement with Great Britain is needed to replace the unexecuted pact among France, Great Britain and the United States.

August Gavaux, editor of the Journal des Debats, says that he is glad France is to get adequate protection, but recalls with regret that Article X of the Versailles Treaty was not adopted by the United States.
