#### Terrible Hail Storm.

The Graaff Reinet (South Africa) Herald of October 31, contains the following report: -On Sunday we were visited with one o the most terrible storms ever known in Fort Beaufort. The wind blew with great violence, and the rain dashed down in torrents, accompanied with enormous hail-For ten minutes er a quarter of an stones. hour the storm of wind, rain and hail, raged with incredible fury, and threatened to lay the town in ruins. Two or three roofs were blown off by the wind, and many houses drenched by the rain, while the hailstones, as large as ben's eggs, without any exaggeration, flew about, and made a good deal of work for the glazier. Fruit and other trees particularly vines, suffered considerable damage. Those houses facing the west sustained most loss in glass. 
