Getaway: Tell me about your upcoming show.

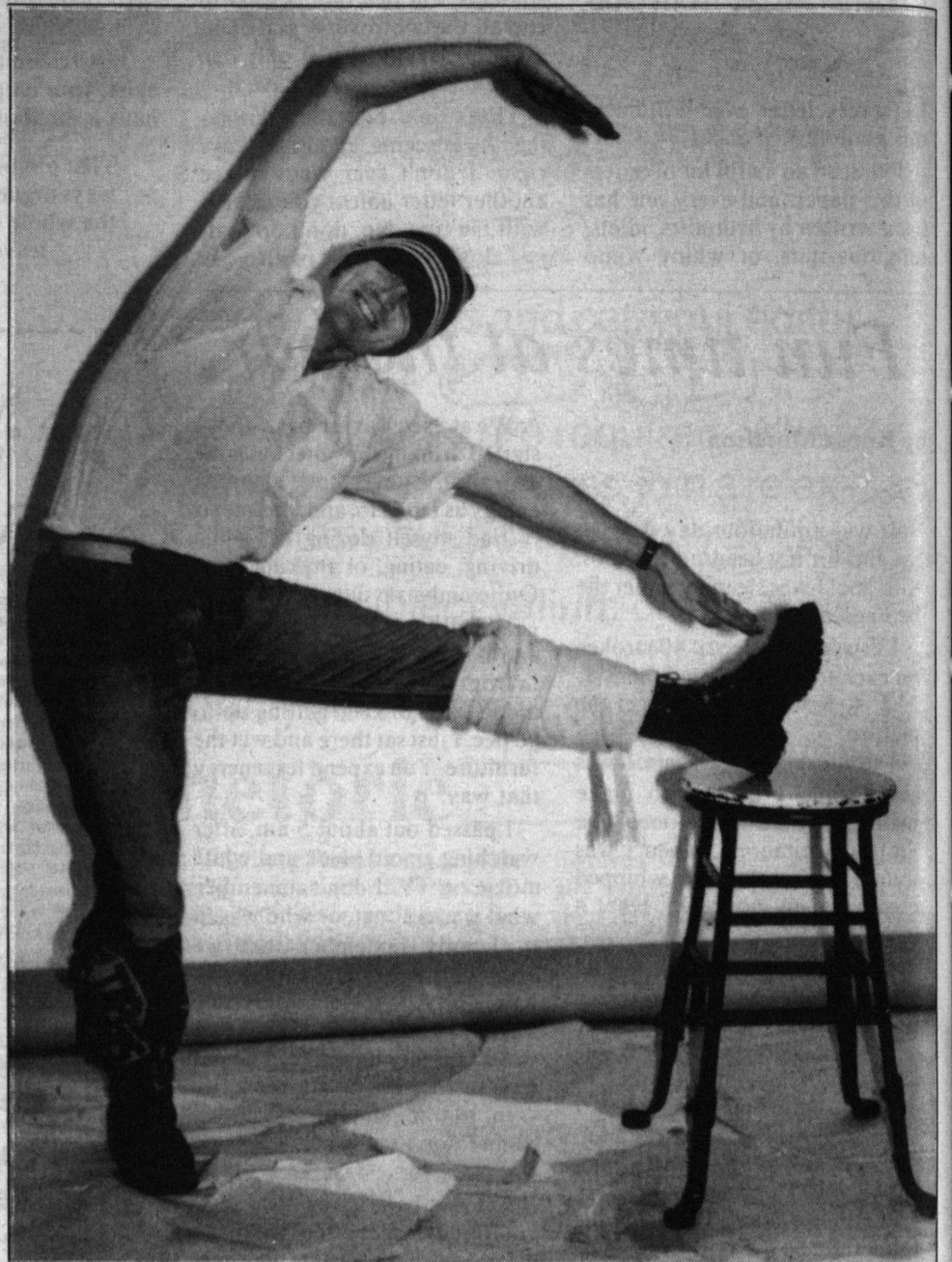

U3 to save universe then Calgary on current tour

In a non-scheduled stop on their whirlwind tour to save the universe, Bangladesh rock group U3 descended on the Edmonton rock scene last Friday and delighted thousands of fans by playing an impromptu concert on the doorstep of City Hall.
