Given in marriage by her father, the bride was gowned in pearls, white peau de soie with Empire waistline and A-line skirt

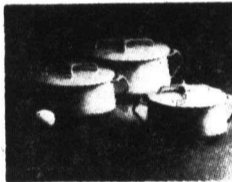

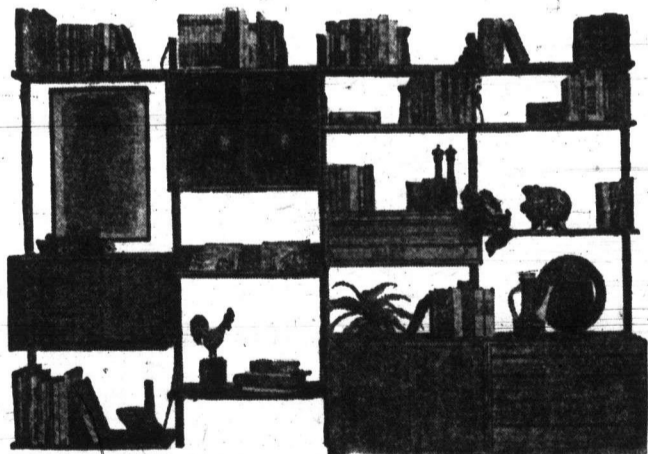
