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Volleys of "No, No," greeted his question, particularly addressed to opponents of Liberalism in the audience, whether "any one of you has given Mr. Meighen the right to carry on the Government of Canada during the past six months?" "You see," he said, "Mr. Meighen stands convicted by his own supporters."

Mr. King dealt with the Progressive movement, emphasizing the impossibility of any coalition between the Liberals and Progressives in the next Parliament in view of the attitude of the Farmers' party, and while stressing the certainty of a Liberal victory, emphasized the danger of this "class movement."

Little Heckling

There was comparatively little heckling. A few interruptions came from a small block located in one of the galleries but the interrupters were speedily silenced by Mr. King's ready retorts.

Brief addresses were given by Hon. W. R. Motherwell, Liberal candidate for Regina, and Col. W. T. Thompson, of Ottawa. The chair was occupied by Col. J. A. Cross, and with him on the platform were gathered Premier Martin, Rev. E. W. Stapleford, J. F. Bole, Andrew MacBeth, W. G. Vance, Hon. W. R. Motherwell and other stalwarts. At the conclusion of the meeting, which did not break up until after 11 o'clock, hundreds crowded up to the platform to shake the hands of the Liberal leader.

Mr. King said:

"I am now beginning the third month of the campaign but I think I can safely say that in all the provinces that I have been I have not met with a single audience more interested in every way than the present audience which greets my good friend, Dr. Thompson, and myself this evening."

"I thank you most heartily for your kindness in turning out this evening and meeting with me in support of the candidate who is running in the interests of the Liberal party in this constituency."

Regret Hard Times.

"Before touching on the questions of the day I would like to also thank the many friends who came to the station this evening to meet my friend, Dr. Thompson, and myself, and to also thank your chairman and Mr. Motherwell for all the kind things they have had to say in reference to myself. I deem it a great privilege to again have the pleasure of visiting Western Canada and to again find myself in the city of Regina. There is the experience that every man from Eastern Canada experiences when again coming to this great province of the West, to see from time to time, the evidences of great expansion which are so much to the fore. I only regret that at the present time the country is not quite so prosperous as one would wish."

"Everyone in the West is going through a trying experience. Speaking as a Liberal I cannot help but feel that had that great policy of reciprocity which we fought so hard for in the West at the time of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's administration have been saved to us, there would have been a demand for our manufacturing and commodities that would have inevitably brought prosperity to our country."

Is Liberal Movement.

"When the East is prosperous the West is prosperous. I have always maintained that the Progressive policy as I saw it at the time I was here before was a Liberal movement. I stated on the last occasion I was in the West that I thought the underlying purpose of the Progressive movement was a great liberal expansion having regard to the needs of the farmers of our country."

Hoped For Unity

"Believing that, I did my utmost to hold out to all whom I met the need of co-operation between all the men and women who feel and think alike in liberal principles to make these policies prevail. I had great hopes that when the day of the election came along we would, after waiting so long to form a democratic government, have brought together the men and women who were of one mind in the matter of defeating the administration that has anything at heart except the interests of the people."

"But I regret to find that notwithstanding that the Liberal Party shows its sympathy in the city as well as in the rural section with the great agricultural industry of the West by selecting for its candidate one who was for years the Minister of Agriculture in this province, that it has been thought desirable to force into the contest a third candidate, the only effect of which will be to so divide the forces opposed to the present administration as to make possible the return of a supporter of that administration."

Need Consideration

"It is a serious situation, and I hope you will think it over very carefully, from the point of view of your own interests, because you will be choosing the man who will voice your opinions in Parliament for the next five years. It will come too late after December 6 for you to realize that the Liberal Party stretched out the hand of good will toward the farming community of this province (believing by so doing it was helping the cities and towns) and that it was refused and there has been returned a supporter of the administration which we are wanting to see defeated."

"From the point of view of Liberals and Progressives alike there is the desire to see the present administration end as speedily as possible. While there may be that desire, never have we had in Canada before an administration that has so completely usurped the rights of the people and ignored the will of the people at every turn. I do not think I need go far to make plain that fact."

Who Made Issue?

"Mr. Meighen is telling you there is only one issue before the people, protection or free trade. Who made that issue? Did you? Unless you did your rights have been usurped because in a country where we believe
