

is much broken rocky or  
marshy land, a location if  
regularly surveyed might include  
a large area of land, very  
little of which would be  
fit for cultivation, whereas  
the Agent and Chief and  
principal men of the Band  
consent, it is thought, locate  
the Indians upon desirable  
parcels of land including  
in each sufficient wood  
land as well as land for  
cultivation.

Should you, however,  
consider it quite impracticable  
to carry out these suggestions,  
it would be well that you  
should ascertain and report  
what the cost would be  
of subdividing each of the  
Reserves into regular lots,  
say of 50 acres each.
