International Bible Lesson for To-morrow.

The Second Miracle of Cana—John 4, 43-54.

Golden Text—"The same works that I do bear witness of me that the Father hath sent me."

After spending two days in Samaria, doing no miracles, but making many hearts happy and being honored by its people, as He was not by His own nation, Galilee welcomes Him. This second sign of our Lord's Messiahship comes through the sick son of a government officer, who, hearing of Jesus' return north, goes at once for Him as a great human healer of disease, but not believing Jesus' divine power to heal by His word alone.

Note the stages of faith. First, if I see Him coming I believe He will heal. Second, if He don't come I must take His word, "Go home, thy son liveth"; if I cannot take Him, I will take it. Compare the Centurian's faith that said, "Speak the word only," etc.—Matt. 8, 1-13. The servants meet and tell their master it is according to Jesus' word, and he becomes a believer in Christ Jesus, and his whole household. His faith was contagious. If our faith is not infectious it is not the true faith of Christ.

Mrs. Jos. Stewart is seriously ill with pneumonia.

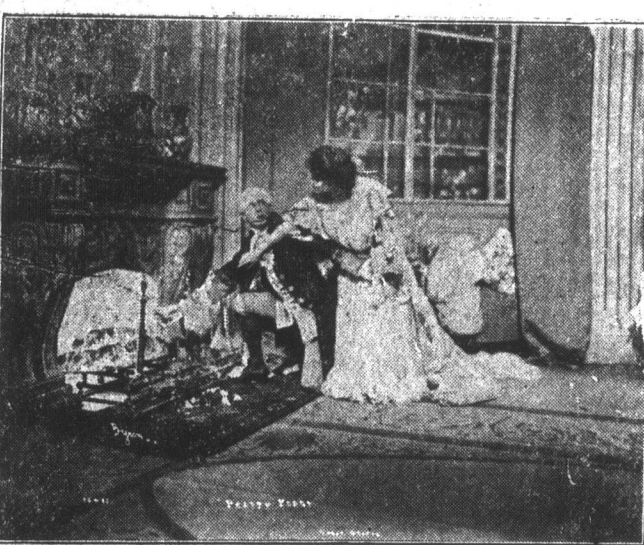
R. Pasmore, while working at Byram & Murphy's mill last week, had his finger so badly crushed that it was necessary to take off part of the finger.

Scene From "Pretty Peggy"

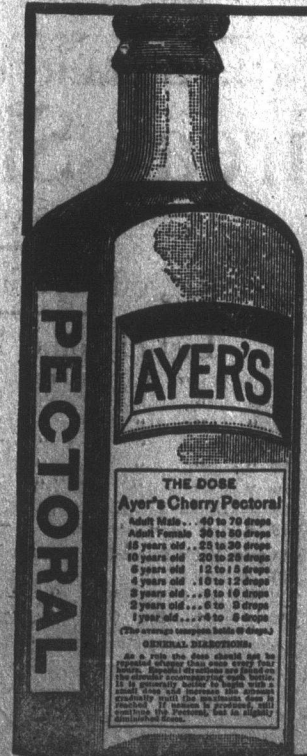
