The truth is boldly asserted by the Bakinskia Isvestia, which, it must be remembered, like all Russian papers, is published under the supervision of the censor.

Baked Potatoes.

Baked potatoes are supposed to be very easily digested, and so they are when they are baked properly. A hot oven is necessary, for a strong degree of heat is required to turn the starch of the potato to dextrin. Cooked in a slow oven a baked potato is no more digestible than boiled. Potatoes in the shell are very good, besides being wholesome. Bake large potatoes, and when quite done cut off a piece from one end and scoop out the inside: Mash with salt, pepper, butter, a little hot milk and the white of an egg to three potatoes, the egg heaten stiff. Refill the shells and return to the oven for a few minutes.

Curing the Gapes.

I keep wheat soaking in a small both tie of turpentine. If a chick wheezes, snuffles and ratties as though it had a cold, this is the forerunner of gapes, says an Illinois breeder in American Agriculturist. In such case the chick is nearly always a goner. Carbolic acid will help him if anything will.

Hold the chick's head in these, drawing him away for a second or two to let him catch his breath. Don't let him get his bill in the acid. If he is still wheezing the next day repeat the dose. I never failed to kill a chick that I gave both carbolic acid and turpentine in one day.
