TO WELCOME THE KING.

The Elaborate Preparations Being Made in Paris.

Paris, April 20 .-- The movement to oring about a more friendly under standing between France and Britain makes rapid progress. King Edward's portrait appears in the illustrated papers and in the shop windows, and Parisians take a keen interest in the gala preparations for the royal visit. The President of the British Chamber of President of the British Chamber of Commerce has invited all the British establishments in Paris to display French and British flags during the King's stay in the city, and also to give a whole holiday to their employees on a whole holiday to their employees on May 2. The programme comprises a review at Vincennes of twelve thousand French troops of the garrison of Paris, and the French Government and the stewards of the Jockey Club are organizing a grand special race meeting for the King at Longchamps. At the Theatre Français all the best comedians will appear, and, with Jules Claretie at their head, will welcome the King in the historic green room. A gala performance at the opera will beking in the historic green room. A gala performance at the opera will begin with the singing of "God Save the King," The performances will include the "Coronation March," composed for King Edward's accession by Saint-Saens; the third act of "La Statue," a trio from "Faust." and the superb baltet from "Le Cid." It has been decided not to give "Samson and Delila," as originally intended, thinking that the Biblical character of Saint-Saens' composition might wound the religious susceptibility of Englishmen. The operahouse will be illuminated outside and inside, and will be resplendent with the décorations which excited admiration on the occasion of the visit of the Czar and Czarina to Paris in 1896. A dozen and Czarina to Paris in 1896. A tlozen crosses of the Legion of Honor have already been conferred upon the flag officers and commanders of the British squadron that greeted President Lou-bet at Algiers on the way to hold his Republican durbar on the confines of the Sahara desert, and more crosses and red ribbons are in store for the breasts of the noble Britons selected to accompany the King to Paris. Since the long ago days when the Zouaves and the Highlanders fraternized in the Crimea there has not been such a wave of Franco-English cordiality.

Stumpy Weapon to Replace Lee-Enfield in British Journals.

Some important and drastic alter Some important and drastic alterations are being made in the Government small-arms factories consequent on the arrangement made by the war Office for the new pattern of rifle, the adoption of which roused considerable comments some months ago.

The newly adopted weapon is called the "Lee-Enfield Modified." Its ed the "Lee-Enfield Modified." Its mechanism, so it is claimed, is much less complex than that of the present Lee-Enfield; it is composed of a smaller number of parts, and is therefore turned out at less cost of time and material, and finally the "modified" is said to possess greater velocity of discharge.

The weapon, exclusively described some months ago in the columns of The Express, elicited some adverse

comments.
The new rifle, it was urged, was stumpy in appearance, being the outcome of an idea to provide all branches of our service with a small arm of one uniform pattern. It is, in fact, really a compromise between

rifle and a carbine.

It is five inches shorter than the existing rifle, which would certainly suggest that the full effectiveness of

suggest that the full effectiveness of the infantry arm is in danger of being sacrificed to the hardly equal advantage of uniformity.

For with a diminished length of barrel the backsight and foresight are brought much closer together, thereby increasing the possible angle of error in aining, and causing a most regrettable loss of accuracy at the longer ranges so common at the present day.

The loss of reach in a bayonet fight, too, should be a consideration.

Another novelty about the new weapon is provided by the barrel, weapon is provided by the barrel, which is entirely covered by a wood casing up to about an inch of the muzzle—an improvement which will undoubtedly be fully appreciated.

Some critics have dealt rather severely with the system of sighting. The back-sight, compared with the existing pattern, is somewhat clumsy to look at. The flap is large, and provides for adjustment up to considerable range without being raised, this only being necessary at extreme distances from the objective. Despite appearances, this

sary at extreme distances from the objective. Despite appearances, this arrangement is advantageous.

The backsight is practically the only portion of the barrel of the rifle which emerges from the wooden case. This so thoroughly envelopes ing. This so thoroughly envelopes the barrel that heat radiation, which in the present pattern is disseminated over the whole exposed length, is likely to concentrate itself at the only outlet to be found—at the backonly outlet to be found—at the back-sight and immediately in front of the eye of the firer. This is a pos-sible defect which would minimize the accuracy of the arm.
