NEARED SOUTH POLE

SUCCESS OF THE BRITISH EXPLOR-ING EXPEDITION.

How Captain Scott Has Added to Know ledge of the Antarctic Continent-South Pole Land Was Once Park of Australia-Map of Antarctic Continent, According to Latest Discoveries.

According to Latest Discoveries.

Scientific and geographical circles are deeply interested in the information brought from the Antarctics by the relief steamer Morning, which recently arrived at New Zealand after a successful search for the British Antarctic exploring expedition, which sailed from Australia in the fall of 1901 in the ship Discovery, under command of Captain R. F. Scott of the British navy.

The relief party found the Discovery on Jan. 23 in MacMurdo Bay, Victoria Land. The expedition wintered 400 miles further south than any vessel had previously done, and

any vessel had previously done, and Captain Scott, with Dr. Wilson and Lieutenant Shackleton, penetrated

100 miles still farther south, reaching latitude 82.17, which establishes a record, being four degrees higher than has heretofore been accomplish-

ed.
Not only was this record established, but information of much value lished, but information of much value to geographers and scientists was obtained. From the fact that Captain Scott in the high southern latitude that he attained saw the range of mountains which begins in Victoria Land still trending south it is avident that the most important discovery in Antarctic geography has been made.

evident that the most important discovery in Antarctic geography has been made.

Scientists judge from the topography of the land which the Captain Scott expedition visited that this range of mountains and high plateau probably extends over or near the south pole and then almost due north to what is known as Graham Land. The mountains and the plateau connected with them discharge enormous glaciers into the Pacific, which makes up the great ice barrier noted by all explorers and which prevents vessels either touching or seeing the mainland from the Mount Erebus and Terror region all the way to Graham Land.

If this line of Antarctica is approximately correct, it is probable that from the other side of Graham Land, south of the Atlantic, the Antarctic continent curves inward and then strikes over toward the northeast watch it is joins Enderby Land and Kemp Land, and finally Wilkes Land, which in tura connects with Victoria Land.

The Discovery expedition has determined that the great ice barrier in the south is a gigantic glacier, and behind it a high mountainous country that probably extends to the pole.

The fact is that there is quite like-

pole.

The fact is that there is quite likely a great south continent, with huge mountains running through it, covered with masses of ice. It is probable, as has been held by Antarctic explorers, that this land is a continuation of Australia and New Zealand, from which it has been separated in the distant past, because there is a similarity between the animal and plant life there and in the islands at the south of the east-

animal and plant life there and in the islands at the south of the east-ern continent. Evidently it was once all one land. Captain R. F. Scott, who com-mands the expedition and who will remain another year in the Antarctic regions to continue the work which

has already been so fruiful of results, is but little over thirty and looks still younger. He is about 5 feet 6 inches in height, with blue eyes and brown hair.

The ship Discovery was built at Dundee expressly for the expedition and is of exceptional strength. The expedition has been very lucky, having lost but one man. The Morning brought back some of the Discovery party, but Captain Scott still has forty-one men with him. The expedition will return next year.

SKETCHES OF THE LIVES OF THE JURISTS IN THE GAMEY CASE.

Sir John Alexander Boyd, Chancellor of Ontario, and Hon. W. G. Falconbridge, Chief Justice of the High Court of Justice-Both Had Distinguished Educa tional Careers and Have Won Honors


Sir John Alexander Boyd is the son of the late John Boyd, who was for many years the principal of Bay street Academy, Toronto. He was born here on April 23, 1837. He was educated at Upper Canada College, where he obtained a scholarship and won the modern language gold medal when graduating in 1860. In the following year he proceeded to hi M.A. degree and was subsequently for a number of years one of the University examiners. He adopted law as a profession and was called to the bar in 1863. After practising for a time with D. B. Read, Q. C., he entered the firm of Blaie & Kerr, where he continued until appointed Master in Chancery. Later pointed Master in Chancery. Later



in 1872, on the elevation of Hon. S. H. Blake to the bench as Vice-Chan-cellor, he resigned his office and recellor, he resigned his office and resumed his place at the bar as a member of his old firm. Mr. Boyd was regarded as one of the ablest equity pl. aders in the province and was made a Q.C. by patent of the Dominion in 1880. He was appointed Ch. ncellor of Ontario in 1881, succeeding the late Hon. J. C. Spragge. In 1887, he became president of the High Court of Justice. In 1888-9 he acted as arbitrator for the Dominion Government in the matter of certain claims preferred by The late Duke of Tetuan, the Spanish nobleman with the Irish family name of O'Donnell, who has just been laid to rest, was a courtly Castilian to his last breath. Not many days before his death Maria Christina, the Queen mother, inquired sympathetically after him, sending a secretary personally to the old statesman's residence. The Duke, manifesting much emotion, told the regal emissary that he had not long to live. He did not, however, waver in his respect for the royal house and promised to advise the Queen before the sad event occurred. True to his premise, he on the morning of his death ordered his son to telephone to Her Majesty, telling her that his end was near and that he was then rendering her his final obeisance.
