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WILL NEWFOUNDLAND COME IN?

Newfoundland, Britain's oldest colony, promises to furnish a sensation in the near future. It will be in the nature of a question as to whe ther the island shall become a part of Canada and remain British, or keep its nominal standing as a British colony, while leaning towards annexation, practically, with the United States. The present governing party, headed by Sir Robert Bond, carried the last election on the issue of the adoption of the Bond-Blaine reciprocal treaty, while the former Premier, Sir William Whiteway, and his colleague, Attorney-General Donald Morrison, opposed the proposal and advocated union with Canada. The Unionists have announced their determination to appeal to the country next year on that basis, opposing both the Bond ministry and the regular opposition, headed by Mr. Alfred Morine. The result will be awaited with interest. Doubtless the Chamberlain policy of uniting the mother country and colonies more firmly will be a factor in the campaign, and with a British preference to colonial products, a powerful in-fluence will be wielded in favor of rounding off the Dominion by making Newfoundland a part of the premier

A NATIONAL DISEASE.

The New York press cherishes no illusions in regard to the Tammany victory in that city, comments the Toronto Star. It is recognized as a triumph of evil, achieved by the aid of all those who desire to cheat the laws of their neighbors, and assisted by the criminal carelessness of the

On former occasions Tammany vic tories were explained on the theory that New York was so lazy that it turned its Government over to any set of men, so long as it was assured that the town would run smoothly until the next election. The people asked only that the corruption and brigandage should not be discovered. They expected to be robbed, but that was a price they were willing to pay to avoid being bothered. It was stated that 'New York's heart was in the right place, and that she would mete out punishment if she realized that Tammany methods caused actual suffering.

Two years ago the infamies of Tammany were laid bare, the homes ruined, the young girls debauched, the frightful white slavery of the brothels, whose ministers were the police and the ward bosses. New York was horrified, and the result was the election of Low, and a reign of decency and enforcement of the law. decency and enforcement of the law.

It does not transpire that New York
ran less smoothly under Mayor Low
and a Fusion cabinet than it did
under VanWyck and his Tammany cost little or nothing, or to attend our institution, say ten months—the electors were bothered by having any governing to do; but it does appear that they were not robbed and that millions of dollars were saved in the management of the public works. In spite of all this, New York last Tuesday returned like a dog to its vomit. It went back to the old rottenness by a majority of 70,000 in an aggregate of 600,000 electors. The New York newspapers present the conclusion that this result was due to the grafters and red lighters all those, from the highest to the lowest, who wish to do something wrong or something less than their contract. In other words, they do not respect the law, and this is a text on which the press of the United States might moralize. Grafting and red lighting in great cities, the wholesale pur chase of Legislatures, the cynical brigandage of municipal politics, negro lynchings, mob violence, all these are symptoms of the same disease. So eminent a man as Grover Cleveland has warned the nation that this disrespect for the law may undermine constitutional structure. The constitution of the United States is supposed to be a daedalean instru ment, in which the spirit of democracy is weighted with a cunning apparatus of authority-the President and the Senate. The constitution was drafted by Alexander Hamilton, an admirer of British institutions, and as far as he was able he made the Republic of the United States of America in sem blance a democracy, in fact a limited monarchy. It is too large a question to discuss where he made mistakes, but, somehow or other, the constitution of the United States has not worked out as Hamilton thought it would. The Republic does not even respect the authority it delegates to
