MOONSTONE, ONT.—The County Council will be asked to build a new bridge over the Sturgeon river on the town line of Medonte and Tay.

FERNIE, B. C .- The by-law authorizing the Council to enter into a ten-year agreement for a water supply was carried last week, also a by-law providing for a sewerage system.

FORT HOPE, ONT. — The agreement between the Town Council and the Standard Ideal Company has been arranged. The latter will erect buildings costing not less than \$8,000.

WINGHAM, ONT.—A by-law will be submitted to the ratepayers in January to issue debentures for \$1,500 to cover the cost of repairs to dam and a new bridge at Water street.

ORILLIA, ONT.—At the November meeting of the Town Council, a report on a sewerage system for the town was submitted by the Mayor, and steps towards construction are likely to be taken immediately.
