Police Magistrate Sustains the Charges

AND DEFENDANTS UO BEFORE THE COUNTY JUDGE-IT IS A TEST CASE.

Hamilton, March 16.—A number of cigar dealers appeared in the police court yesterday, charged with conducting a lottery by selling tickets for the Promotive of Arts association. A. Dorion, of Montreal, represented the association but he remained silent

the Promotive of Arts association. A. Dorion, of Montreal, represented the association, but he remained silent during the hearing of the charges, leaving the defense to J. G. Gauld Mr. Dorion brought with him the articles of incorporation of the association, but they cut no figure with Magistrate Jelfs when produced.

The case of Walter Pedler was first taken up, and Crown Attorney Crerar called to the witness box George Allen. He informed the court that on the days of Feb. 12, 16, 24 and 28 he visited defendant's store and purchased tickets for the arts drawing. He was told he could have a picture. "But can't I have money instead of art?" he asked. He was told that he could, and he left each time with the expectation of drawing a big money prize. In all he bought 21 tickets, but, alas! every one of them was a blank. "Do you know anyone who has won a prize?" inquired the crown attorney. "No." answered Allen; "but I'veo heard some prizes came here." "And they all took money?"
