REV. S. E. MCKEGNEY GOING OVERSEAS

WILL NOT WITHDRAW Though Obligated to Revert to Ranks

About twelve months ago the rector of Trinity Church was appointed chaplain to the 215th Battalion and was granted leave of absence from the parish by the congregation. In the meantime his place has been filled by Rev. J. H. Wheeler. A few days ago the churchwardens were informed by the rector of an interview he had with the Bishop of the Diocese, at which he tendered his resignation. At the same time he gave reasons for taking the course, the main one being that it would leave the Parish free to go forward under a new rector.

The church officers put this question to the congregation and make a strong appeal to the Bishop to decline to accept your resignation on account of the nature and importance of your work in this parish, would you be willing to relinquish the army and return to your congregation who were all thoroughly convinced of your sincerity.

His answer was that he could not consistently do so, much as he regretted leaving them. At the conclusion of the evening service on Easter Sunday a congregational meeting was held in the church. Mr. L. E. Kingery presided. The state of affairs was set forth. A resolution was moved by Mr. Julius Waterous seconded by Mr. J. Hawkins.

"That the church officers communicate with the Bishop of the Diocese, that the congregation desires to retain the Rev. S. E. McKegney as their rector, hereby extend leave of absence, and will welcome his return when relieved of his military duties."

"This was passed unanimously. The rector was then summoned and informed of what had taken place. He said after the active part he had taken in recruiting, he could not consistently relinquish the army, at this time, even though he might leave the ranks. If it were his wish and the Bishop consented, he would be very pleased to remain their rector and looked forward to the time when he could return to them in a few well chosen words he thanked the congregation for their confidence and the kindly treatment he and his wife had received ever since they first came to the parish."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN WEST LAND REGULATION

The sole head of a family, of over 18 years old, may homestead a section of available Dominion land, Saskatchewan or Alberta, must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency, the district. Entry by proxy made at any Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency, on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence on the land in each year. A homesteader may live nine miles of his homestead on a at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required. Residence is performed in the vicinities of the land. A homesteader must reside on the land for a certain period of time.

In certain districts a homestead section standing may pre-empt a section alongside his homestead. Duties—Six months residence, of three years after earning in content also 2000 feet extra. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as homestead tent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his rights may re-locate on a vacant section in certain districts. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as homestead tent on certain conditions. Duties—Must reside six months of three years, cultivate 50 acres of a house worth \$2000.
